Ensemble Montreal selects 1st Filipino-Canadian elected councilor Stephanie Valenzuela for Mayor of CDN-NDG Borough with a strong diverse team

Montréal, August 18, 2025 -Ensemble Montréal leader and mayoral candidate Soraya Martinez Ferrada unveiled her team for Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Dame-de-Grâce (CDN-NDG) on Monday, announcing current city councillor Stephanie Valenzuela as the party's candidate for borough mayor.

Valenzuela, a lifelong resident of Darlington and current councillor, enters the race determined to renew CDN-NDG after what she and her team call nearly a decade of neglect.

" As someone who grew up here, my main goal is to ensure residents feel safe and have the infrastructure and services they deserve. I want CDN-NDG to thrive again," Valenzuela said at the launch.

A Borough in Need of Renewal

Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Damede-Grâce is Montréal's largest and most diverse borough, home to over 160,000 residents from a wide variety of cultural and socio-economic backgrounds. It faces pressing challenges, including aging housing stock, flooding, mobility issues, and public safety concerns.

Valenzuela and her team arque that the current borough leadership has failed to address these problems. They cite deteriorating streets, poorly maintained housing, insufficient flood protections, and what they describe as a general decline in cleanliness and quality of life.

"Our borough deserves leadership that will act decisively for a safer, more welcoming, and

Alongside Valenzuela, Ensemble Montréal is presenting what it calls a strong, dynamic team rooted in the borough's communities and bringing expertise from diverse

 Yvonne Nguyen (Côte-des-Neiges) - an immigration lawyer and Vice-President of External Affairs for the Vietnamese community in Canada, representing the resilience and contributions of immigrant families.

• Peter Shatilla (Notre-Damede-Grâce) - a veteran entrepreneur and merchant with 45 years of experience in NDG, focused on defending small businesses and community needs.

•Alexandre Teodoresco (Loyola) – a professional in innovation and digital transformation, running for office for the first time with a vision of using technology to improve city services.

•Sonny Moroz (Snowdon) currently a sitting councillor seeking re-election, known for his active involvement in community groups and his advocacy for local residents.

Martinez Ferrada highlighted the strength of the team: "Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Dame-de-Grâce is a borough rich in diversity and its many communities. I am pleased to present a team that knows the area and will work with the population. What we are proposing is not just a program: it is a sincere commitment to improving the daily lives of citizens."

Key Commitments for CDN-NDG

At the campaign launch, Valenzuela and Ensemble Montréal outlined several concrete priorities

for the borough:

 Accelerating Affordable Housing - including new projects at the Namur-Hippodrome site and the former YMCA in NDG, in response to the city's housing crisis.

Recreation Infrastructure - building a multisport center in Côte-des-Neiges and adding outdoor facilities across the borough to promote healthy living.

Improving Safety and Preventing Crime - with increased investment in crime prevention programs and closer collaboration with community organizations.

•Expanding Sports

Protections and Infrastructure upgrading systems to better protect neighborhoods that have suffered repeated water damage in recent

•Restoring Cleanliness and

Green Spaces - improving basic municipal services such as snow removal, garbage collection, and maintenance of parks and public spaces.

Valenzuela argued that these measures are critical to ensuring residents feel safe and supported: "People should not have to worry about unsafe housing, flooding in their basements, or neglected parks. CDN-NDG deserves services and infrastructure worthy of a major urban borough."

Criticism of **Administration**

Throughout her announcement, Valenzuela pointed to what she views as the failures of the current borough administration over the past eight years. According to her, streets have become less safe, housing has become more unsanitary, and essential infrastructure projects have stalled.

She framed her candidacy as a chance for residents to choose leaders with strong local ties and the determination to bring meaningful change. "We are not career politicians parachuted into the borough. Every member of our team has lived the realities of CDN-NDG and understands what residents are going through," she said.

Looking Ahead to November

As the election campaign heats up, Valenzuela and her team will continue announcing new local commitments. They emphasize renewal as their core message: restoring dignity, safety, and pride to a borough that is both dynamic and challenged.

"Our vision is simple," Valenzuela concluded. "We want to restore Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Damede-Grâce as a place where people feel proud to live, work, and raise their families. With the right leadership, this borough can once again become a model of diversity, vitality, and opportunity for all."#

New approaches needed for Canada to prepare for, combat wildfires: experts

challenging wildfire season, calls are growing for the country to change how it prepares for, reacts and responds to the natural disasters.

Experts say Ottawa needs to rethink how it deals with wildfires, especially in the midst of a season that has seen thousands of Canadians from different parts of the country be forced to leave their homes.

As of Aug. 18, 7.8 million hectares have burned in Canada this year, according to the Canadian

Interagency Forest Fire Centre.

A national wildland fire situation report states that, as of Aug. As Canada endures another 13, the area burned is substantially greater than the 10-year average. Ken McMullen, the president of the

Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs, which municipal represents firefighters, has been calling for the creation of a national administration.

"We need that coordinating body at the federal level to work on the coordination, the response, the training, the equipment needed in order to most effectively put those resources around our provinces and

territories," McMullen said in an Yolanda Clatworthy, the interim interview.

The revival of the twostate solution for peace between Israel and Palestine

There are quite a number of opinions about the best way to have peace in the Middle East and put an end to the devastation of human life and untold sufferings in the Gaza strip. After a prolonged military seige of the Gaza strip, it has become more urgent to find a way to restore peace and security in this part of the world which appears to be the full implementation of the twostate solution subject to certain conditions that shall be negotiated by all parties concerned.

A statement on Gaza and the viability of the two-state solution dated August 9, 2025 has been issued by Canada. This Affairs demonstrates that there is a clear commitment towards the two-state solution more than ever before:

"The Foreign Ministers of Australia, Austria, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, New Zealand, Norway, the United Kingdom and the High Representative of the European Union strongly reject the decision of the Israeli Security Cabinet on August 8 to launch an additional large-scale military operation in Gaza. It will aggravate the catastrophic humanitarian situation, endanger the lives of the hostages, and further risk the mass displacement of civilians. The plans that the Government of Israel has announced risk violating international law. Any attempts at annexation or of settlement extension violate international law.

"We urge the parties and the international community to make all efforts to finally bring this terrible conflict to an end now, through an immediate and permanent ceasefire that enables the provision of a massive, immediate

unimpeded humanitarian assistance, as the worst-case scenario of a famine is unfolding in Gaza. Hamas must release all hostages without further delay or precondition and must ensure they are humanely treated and not subject to cruelty and humiliation.

"The humanitarian situation in Gaza remains catastrophic. We call on the Government of Israel to urgently find solutions to amend its recent registration system of international humanitarian organisations, to ensure these vital actors of humanitarian aid can continue their essential work again in line with humanitarian principles to reach the civilians in need in Gaza. Their exclusion would be an egregious signal.

"We are united in our commitment to the implementation of a negotiated two-state solution as the only way to guarantee that both Israelis and Palestinians can live side by side in peace, security, and dignity. A political resolution based on a negotiated twostate solution requires the total demilitarisation of Hamas and its complete exclusion from any form of governance in the Gaza Strip, where the Palestinian Authority must have a central

More than a year ago, speeches delivered during a day long debate about the two-state solution were all in favor. The UN Secretary General Antono Guterrez urged all members of the Security Council to implement the twostate solution but both Israel and the United States were the stumblig blocks.

France, Britain, Canada, Australia, and Malta all say they are preparing to recognize a state of Palestine at the upcoming United

General Assembly September. They would join another 147 UN countries that already do so. In some senses, the move is symbolic: It will not change the realities on the ground in the Middle East, at least not in the short term. But it is a major step nonetheless. The remaining issue is whether the United States will veto Palestine's third application for UN membership or abstain.

It seems clear that the UK and France are paving the path for a collective act of recognition by Western liberal democracies by acting in concert and as a bloc. Whatever happens in September, one thing is clear: whether

Palestine becomes a UN member or not, it will have been recognised as a state by nearly all UN members. But for the next month or more, it's still a big question whether or not the two-state solution is viable and possible while Israel's Prime Minister is still in power.#

world, we need to cope with changes that must be made in order to stay relevant to the needs of modern life. For this reason, I have decided to downsize the operations of Gilmore College International because the big space no longer serves its purpose for which it was rented. But first, let me give you a brief historical background of the first Filipino-Canadian owned private school in Quebec. Perhaps by raising awareness about how it began and where it might be going might generate more interest among my fellow citizens and former students

I was a former high school teacher of the Montreal Catholic School Commission, English sector, which is now known as the English Montreal School Board for 25 years. I did two full time teaching jobs for eight years after establishing Gilmore Business Institute in November 1989 before I pre-retired in June 1997 when the Quebec government encouraged senior teachers to leave without penalty if they meet the factor 80 requirement which means having a combined teaching experience and age that equals 80. However, as soon as I retired. I was recruited to be an officer of various community association and my school became the meeting place of at least four of these non-profit organizations for four years. It was too late for me to realize that there would be some consequences for being too busy and doing too many things at the same time. I was late in fulfilling the bureaucratic procedures of managing a private college which would have required a staff of ten employees while I had only one secretary.

When I started my own school in 1989, I did not want to offer the government credit programs and designed my own curriculum instead for which I was given a special permit given for personal improvement courses called "Formation d'appoint." But many people who called me always asked if there would be student loans and bursaries. For this reason, I had to apply for an education permit in September 1995. I prepared myself to face a committee of 12 bureaucrats at the MEQ office on Fullum Street in April 1996 and was interviewed about my objecties in opening my own school. I was happy to receive approval of my application but the permit was granted in October 1996 which was too late for the beginning of the school year. I therefore only began the credit programs for Office Systems Technology, International Trade and Accounting in January 1997. I hired teachers from different ethnic backgrounds that also reflected a multi-cultural enrollment of students. At this time, I already moved to my second location on Decarie Boulevard from the first location of Gilmore Business Institute on 4246 Girouard Avenue in Notre Dame De Grace in April 1996.

In order to make the name of the school easier when translated into French, and due to international students that increased, I decided to change Gilmore Business Institute to Gilmore College International in English and translated into French as College International Gilmore in October 2000.

At the beginning, I started with a few students from different countries

cut and paste method. When he decided to take a holiday in November 1998, I was obliged to do the paper myself using the same tedious cut and paste method. I became extremely busy doing two full time jobs – managing the school and publishing the paper. In my rush to get some

such as Japan, France, Venezuela, Cambodia, Ireland and Korea but more came from Tunisia when a Tunisian businessman got involved in recruiting students and invited me to visit Tunisia to participate in the Canadian Embassy education show in October 2001.

In November 1997, the late Bert Abiera (who recently passed away last November) stopped publishing the materials needed for the November 1998 issue, I fell down 16 steps of the office building and had to be brought to the Montreal General Hospital by ambulance. All students had left at the time of the accident but fortunately, I did not have any concussion but stayed in the hospital from 3:00 to 9:30 p.m. without any supper and went home by taxi. No one from my family knew where I was as I thought I would

Filipino Star. Being one of his advertisers, I was sad to see it close down. When he asked me to help him get people to form a company to become shareholders, I was able to convince 15 people but eventually they changed their minds and I ended being alone as the only shareholder of Filcan Publications, Inc. I published the first issue of the paper under a slightly revised name by adding North American to the original name of Filipino Star. From the first month of publishing in April 1998 until October 1998, I paid Bert Abiera a monthly salary to produce the paper using the

be brought to the Jewish General Hospital but for some reasons I was brought to the Montreal General Hospital.

It seemed as if being busy with the newspaper was not enough as another task was added when Col. Camilo Tiqui came to my office in July 2003 as he proposed that since I was already in education, it would be an extension into the Scouting movement to which I agreed and became Scouts Canada's Group Commissioner of the first Filipino Scout group named Laging Handa for seven years until September 2010. This was followed by

my attempt to save a bankrupt cooperative with my personal line of credit and loans from June 2006 to October 2011. One of the students I was teaching French was the Coop's treasurer who sought my help and I agreed. I gave some money to pay for some merchandise but this did not end with this loan that was never paid. I became fully involved in managing the cooperative when she asked me to take over her treasurer position. Without thinking too hard, I agreed and that was the beginning of my endless worries in my fruitless efforts of saving a cooperative because of my ardent desire to promote unity and cooperation in the community. I thought my fellow citizens would patronize their own Coop.

In 2005, Chinese businessman, James Ma, offered to recruit students to enroll in a new program known as Personal Support Worker (PSW) everywhere in Canada but known as PAB (Préposé aux bénéficiares) in Quebec. I was was able to have 13 batches of PAB graduates from May 2005 until July 2017. All these graduates are successfully employed in Montreal, Calgary, Vancouver and Toronto. They were properly trained by retired nurses who taught the program. James Ma who owns a travel agency, Concord Tours, also invited me to seek partnerships with Chinese universities and arranged my travel to China in February 2001. However, due to the expiration of the education permit in June 2001, the projected partnership with Chinese schools and universities did not materialize.

In September 2013, the owner of ICI Television, Mr. Mohamed Norouzi, came to my office on Queen Mary near Coolbrook to promote his ethnic television station and suggested the idea of producing a community television show in view of my experience in newspaper publishing. I accepted his offer to become one of the ethnic producers. on the newly organized television channel. I recruited first Al Abdon as he had the experience in video production. Subsequently, some names were proposed to be the hosts namely, Derwin Collantes and Tenne Rose Dayandante as well as Michael Davantes. Over a short period of time, more members of the TV crew were added but there was a lack of sales people to sell advertising so within two years I decided to end the show on January 30, 2016, after producing 59 episodes that are still viewable on Youtube.

When the bureaucratic procedures of immigration changed in June 2017, an education permit to be a designated learning institution became necessary to continue accepting international students. An education consultant advised me about the rigid requirements in obtaining an education permit. The school's location on Queen Mary Road with 1500 square feet space was not

Roxboro Completes Permanent Dike to Prevent Floods

August 15, 2025 Roxboro, QC - In a landmark step toward climate resilience, the City of Montreal has officially completed a permanent dike in Roxboro, providing lasting protection for hundreds of residents living along the vulnerable shores of the Rivière des Prairies.

plantings will help integrate the structure into the neighborhood while providing habitat for pollinators and small wildlife.

Residents Welcome Relief

For longtime resident André Bouchard, who has lived just two blocks from the water for 25 years, the

The \$12 million project, which broke ground in the spring of last year, marks the culmination of years of community advocacy and municipal planning following two devastating flood seasons in 2017 and 2019. Those events inundated streets, damaged dozens of homes, and dis-placed families for weeks. Temporary sandbag walls and modular flood barriers had been the only defense against rising waters until now.

"This dike isn't just an engineering project's peace of mind," said Montreal Mayor Valérie Plante during the ribbon-cutting ceremony. "We're building for the future, understanding that extreme weather events are no longer rare. With this permanent structure, Roxboro residents will be better protected for generations to come."

A Design Built for the Future

The new barrier spans approximately 600 meters along the waterfront and stands at a height capable of holding back floodwaters significantly above historic peaks. Built with a reinforced earth core, geotextile membranes, and a protective stone slope, the dike is designed to withstand both strong currents and ice pressure in spring thaw conditions.

In addition to protection, the city incorporated community-friendly features into the project. A pedestrian path runs along the top of the dike, connecting green spaces and offering panoramic views of the river. Decorative landscaping and native

dike represents the end of an anxious chapter.

"Every spring, we used to hold our breath," Bouchard said. "In 2019, I watched the water creep closer to my basement door. We had to evacuate with only a few hours' notice. Now, we finally have a real sense of security."

Local community groups, including the Roxboro Citizens' Association, have praised the city for fulfilling its commitment to flood prevention. "We've been asking for permanent protection for years," said president association Claire Deschamps. "This is a victory for everyone who fought for our homes and our neighborhood's future."

Part of a Larger Strategy

The Roxboro dike is part of Montreal's larger Climate Adaptation and Flood Resilience Plan, which also upgrading includes stormwater drainage networks, restoring wetlands to absorb excess water, and building additional permanent barriers in other flood-prone districts.

Balancing Protection with the Environment

Environmental groups have largely supported the project, noting that the city consulted with ecologists to minimize negative impacts on the

river ecosystem. Measures include carefully sloped banks to reduce erosion and the planting of - to stabilize soil and provide shade for aquatic species.

"Human safety environmental health can go hand in hand," said Marie-Eve Lapointe, a spokesperson for the Quebec Environmental Alliance. "By including green design elements, the city is showing that climate resilience doesn't have to come at nature's expense."

A Symbol of Preparedness

For many in Roxboro, the dike

has become more than just a flood barrier; it's a visible symbol of preparedness in an era where climate change is increasingly shaping local

"The floods were traumatic for community," Mayor Plante our reflected. "But today, standing on this dike, we can see what's possible when government and citizens work together. This is protection, yes, but it's also hope."

Île-aux-Tourtes Bridge Construction Nears Completion

The \$2.3 billion project, launched in 2022, aims to replace the aging 1965 structure, which has long suffered from structural deterioration and capacity issues. The bridge carries more than 87,000 vehicles daily along Highway 40, making it one of the busiest routes in Quebec.

To keep traffic moving during construction, temporary lanes have been set up on the existing bridge, with speed limits reduced for safety. While some commuters have voiced frustration over congestion, many say they see the long-term benefits.

"It's inconvenient now, but it's worth it," said Vaudreuil resident Marie-Claude Bouchard, who uses the bridge daily. "The old bridge felt like it was falling apart. This new one is an investment in our safety."

Environmental Considerations

Construction teams have implemented measures to limit

According to Quebec's Ministry of Transport and Sustainable Mobility, recent months have seen the installation of major structural supports, concrete deck sections, and safety barriers on several spans. "We are entering one of the most visible phases of the project." said TransportMinister Geneviève Guilbault during a press briefing on Friday. "Drivers will notice the rapid progress, and we remain committed to deliver-City engineers will conduct ing a safer, more resilient bridge."

The new Ile-aux-Tourtes Bridge condition. Emergency response teams will feature three lanes in each emergency use, and a multi-use path for pedestrians and cyclists first for the crossing. Built with modern seismic standards and corrosion-resistant materials, the structure is designed to withstand extreme weather events and heavy traffic for decades to come.

Minimizing Disruption

impacts on the Ottawa River, including sediment control systems and careful scheduling of in-water work to protect fish habitats. Noise barriers and dust suppression systems are also in place to reduce disturbance to nearby communities.

Looking Ahead

The project is on track for substantial completion by late 2026, with full opening to traffic expected in early 2027. Once operational, the existing bridge will be dismantled. Officials say the new crossing will not only improve safety and capacity but also encourage more sustainable travel with its pedestrian and cycling infrastructure.

"This bridge is more than just concrete and steel, a lifeline for thousands of families, businesses, and communities," Minister Guilbault said. "We are building something that will serve Quebecers for the next 75 years."#

enough to accommodate a cafeteria, library and executive offices. For this reason, I leased another office building owned by the same landlady on Cote des Neiges corner Jean Talon West on Sept. 15, 2015. The moving costs were very expensive which turned out to be a waste of money because my three attempts to obtain an education permit in 2016, 2018, and 2019 were not successful for lack of financial and human resources. according to the Ministry of Education bureacrats although I had presented a signed memorandum of agreement with James Ma, a Chinese businessman willing to invest \$300,000 in the school.

Realizing that the school could no longer accept international students which could have been the best source of revenue, I felt quite devastated as I was afraid that this would be the end of my dream of building a school to promote the values of education in the creation of an ideal society. Furthermore, the covid pandemic that adversely affected all businesses between 2019-2020 also interrupted my school's operations.

At the end of the pandemic, things have changed for many different reasons as students seem to prefer going to the government schools and non-profit language centers more than ever before. Even the truck drivers on temporary worker permits who previously enrolled at Gilmore have also been provided with free French lessons at their work places. Even though all tuition fees paid to Gilmore are all income tax deductible, students do not seem to be interested. It appears that free French courses which are readily available to newcomers are hard to beat. Moreover there are many Filipino-Canadians living in Quebec for many years who do not speak French but they do not show any interest in learning the language. The young generation of Filipinos born in Canada do not need the French courses I offer as they are ang problemang ito dahil ang mga "naturalized citizens" ay hindi na maaring tanggalin. rekomendasyon namin sa lahat ng aming mga kliente na mag-apply ng "citizenship" kapag "eligible" na sila.#

already bilingual because of being obliged to attend French schools.

The international student market could have been the only area that Gilmore could have competed successfully with other schools because it had always charged the lowest rates in Montreal but charging the lowest rates was probably not a good idea and could be considered a missed opportunity to build up the school's finances. However, this decision was based on my desire to help students from third world countries specially those from the Philippines as most parents have to sacrifice a lot in order to send their children to study abroad. Gilmore was the only private school that charged very low tuition fees of \$8 per hour or \$7,200 for a year of studies while both private and government schools usually charge between \$20,000 to \$30,000 a year. One of my former international students from the Philippines, Justin Simporios who moved to Vancouver six years ago, recently won \$80 million from a Lotto Max draw last May. He paid his tuition fees of \$7,200 in May 2015 which was a coincidence because he became a record holder of being the only single winner of a big jackpot in the same month of his arrival in my school. It was a surreal experience for me to have made a difference in someone's life.

As the saying goes, everything happens for a reason. Perhaps, with the changes that I am contemplating to do, I may have a better result than before, from working too hard over the past 36 years. I believe that I should still continue my mission as a teacher for I believe in the value of education in making a difference.

Gaza takeover plan only pleases Netanyahu himself

(CNN) Analysis by Tal Shalev Tel Aviv - August 8, 2025 - Nearly two years into the war in Gaza, the Israeli security cabinet voted for yet another military expansion: the proposed takeover of Gaza City. The plan, which was initiated and pushed by Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu himself, arguably reveals more about his domestic political maneuvering than evidence of any well-thought-out military strategy.

The plan was adopted despite the Israeli military leadership's fierce objection and grave warnings it could both deepen the humanitarian crisis and endanger the remaining 50 hostages in Gaza. The major expansion of the war also comes against the backdrop of a fundamental erosion of support for Israel around the world, and a decline in internal public backing for the continuation of the war.

And yet, Netanyahu pushed his plan forward, as it has at least one unstated benefit: it gives him time to fight for his political survival. And with his current far-right coalition partners, that means prolonging the war. Time and again, Netanyahu's allies, Itamar Ben Gvir and Bezalel Smotrich, have thwarted and aborted progress in ceasefire negotiations by threatening to collapse his government if the war were to end.

Netanyahu's plan to besiege Gaza City actually falls short of what his coalition partners demand: Ben Gvir and Smotrich are pushing for a full occupation of the embattled enclave as a first step for rebuilding the Jewish settlements in Gaza and ultimately annexing the territory. It is also less than what Netanyahu himself had been selling ahead of the meeting.

In an interview on Thursday, Netanyahu told Fox News that Israel intends to take control of all of Gaza, as if he had made up his mind to fully occupy the territory.

Instead, the Israeli leader chose to promote a phased plan, focusing only on Gaza City for the time

being, without taking over other camps nearby, where many of the 20 remaining Israeli hostages are believed to be held captive, also intentionally set a relatively loose deadline for the beginning of the operation - in two months - leaving the door open for another diplomatic push for a ceasefire hostage deal to reemerge and call the whole thing off.

Now, his right-wing partners are fuming at the decision, charging that the plan isn't enough and that only escalating the war will suffice

A source close to Smotrich said, "The proposal led by Netanyahu and approved by the cabinet may sound good, but it is actually just more of the same. This decision is neither moral, nor ethical, nor Zionist."

Netanyahu's latest plan pleases neither his coalition partners nor Israel's military leadership. During the marathon 10-hour cabinet meeting, Israeli military Chief of Staff Eyal Zamir presented the army's stark opposition to the government's reoccupation plans. Israel's top general warned that a renewed military excursion would endanger both the remaining hostages and Israeli soldiers, cautioning that Gaza would become a trap that would further exhaust IDF forces already worn down by almost two years of continuous fighting, and deepen the Palestinian humanitarian crisis.#

that's burning. If we don't start to do more mitigation work, then we're just chasing fires."

Size of Canada is a challenge: expert

McGillivray, the managing director of the Institute for Catastrophic Loss Reduction and an adjunct professor of the disaster and emergency management program at York University, is to create a federal ground force made up of Indigenous people.

"They have millennia-long knowledge in the use of fire and the use of controlled burning and cultural burning," he said.

McGillivray added that the time is ripe for Canada to re-evaluate wildfire seasons, especially with a warming climate.

"We need to really start thinking differently about this fire problem," he said. "We continue to think in the same ways — and it's obviously not working.

However, there is a recognition that ultimately there are circumstances outside of Canada's control, including the country's sheer size

"It's a massive country — the second largest in the world ... and almost 60 per cent of it is boreal forest," McGillivray said, adding that large swaths of Canada are remote and difficult to get to.

"The idea that we're going to be able to knock down fire and keep it down across the country is kind of a pipe dream. ... I think we really have to be realistic that, again, there's no easy fixes to this thing."#

Honoré-Mercier Bridge

The Honoré-Mercier Bridge will be reduced to one lane in each direction between 11 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 22, and 5 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 25.

Officials say a detour will be in place via Lafleur Avenue and Clément Street. For the reserved lane, detour via Avenue du Trésor-Caché, Boulevard Lasalle, Rue des Oblats, Rue Airlie and follow detour via Avenue Lafleur and Rue Clément.



What does recognising a Palestinian state mean?

Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer has announced the UK will recognise a Palestinian state in September unless Israel meets certain conditions, including agreeing to a ceasefire in Gaza and reviving the prospect of a two-state solution.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu reacted furiously to the announcement, saying the decision rewarded "Hamas's monstrous terrorism".

What would it mean if recognition does go ahead, and what difference would it make?

It has a large degree of international recognition, diplomatic

missions abroad and teams that compete in sporting competitions, including the Olympics.

But due to the Palestinians' long-running dispute with Israel, it has no internationally agreed boundaries, no capital and no army. Due to Israel's military occupation, in the West Bank, the Palestinian authority, set up in the wake of peace agreements in the 1990s, is not in full control of its land or people. Gaza, where Israel is also the occupying power, is in the midst of a devastating war.

Given its status as a kind of quasi-state, recognition is inevitably somewhat symbolic. It will represent a

strong moral and political statement but change little on the ground.

But the symbolism is strong. As Foreign Secretary David Lammy pointed out during his speech at the UN on Tuesday, "Britain bears a special burden of responsibility to support the two-state solution".

He went on to cite the 1917 Balfour Declaration - signed by his predecessor as foreign secretary Arthur Balfour - which first expressed Britain's support for "the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people".

But that declaration, Lammy said, came with a solemn promise "that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine".

Supporters of Israel have often pointed out that Lord Balfour did not refer explicitly to the Palestinians or say anything about their national rights.

But the territory previously known as Palestine, which Britain ruled through a League of Nations mandate from 1922 to 1948, has long been regarded as unfinished international business.

Israel came into being in 1948, but efforts to create a parallel state of Palestine have foundered, for a multitude of reasons.

As Lammy said, politicians "have become accustomed to uttering the words 'a two-state solution".

The phrase refers to the creation of a Palestinian state, alongside Israel, in the West Bank, including East Jerusalem and the Gaza Strip, broadly along the lines that existed prior to the 1967 Arab-Israeli war

But international efforts to bring about a two-state solution have come to nothing and Israel's colonisation of large parts of the West Bank, illegal under international law, has turned the concept into a largely empty slogan.

Who recognises Palestine as a state?

The State of Palestine is currently recognised by 147 of the UN's 193 member states.

At the UN, it has the status of a "permanent observer state", allowing participation but no voting rights.

Australia has become the latest country to say it will recognise Palestinian Statehood at the next UN General Assembly in September - after similar announcements from France, Japan, Canada and the UK, on some conditions.

New Zealand said it would consider its position on recognition of a Palestinian state in August, ahead of a formal consideration of the issue in September.

If the UK and France do recognise a Palestinian state next month, Palestine would have the support of four of the UN Security Council's five permanent members - the other two being China and Russia.

This will leave the US, Israel's strongest ally by far, in a minority of one.

US Vice-President JD Vance has reiterated the US has no plans to recognise a Palestinian state, citing a lack of functional government.

Washington has recognised the Palestinian Authority, currently headed by Mahmoud Abbas, since the mid-1990s but has stopped short of recognising an actual state.

But the Britain in 2025 is not the Britain of 1917 when the Balfour Declaration was signed. Its ability to bend others to its will is limited. It is hard to know, right now, what the impact will actually be.

Liza Soberano opens up about traumatic childhood

The nation has long adored Liza Soberano for her beauty, talent, and grace. But behind the star's radiant smile lies a harrowing childhood story she has carried in silence for years. In her newly released interview in Sarah Bahbah's YouTube vlog "Can I Come In," the 26-year-old actress opened up about the

she revealed, was only the beginning of years of cruelty.

Placed under the guardianship of a woman named Melissa — who was supposed to be her mother's high school friend — Liza was subjected to degrading and inhumane treatment. She recalled being mocked as "the family dog" and forced to sit inside a



unimaginable abuse she endured as a child in America — a story so raw that the video has already amassed 2.1 million views in just a few days.

For the first time, Soberano described in detail the violence and neglect she suffered, not only from her mother's boyfriend but also from a foster guardian entrusted with her care.

"I was only two years old," Liza recalled, "when my mom's boyfriend, Michael, stole a van and kept us inside. I remember trying to escape from my car seat. When he caught me, he told me to bash my baby brother's head with it. When I refused, he hit me in the head with the butt of a gun."

The incident ended with her mother being hospitalized and imprisoned, leaving Liza and her younger brother in foster care. That, cardboard box during family movie nights.

The abuse escalated in ways that would leave lifelong scars. "One day their dog pooped on the carpet," Liza said, her voice trembling. "I went to get a brush, but Melissa stopped me. She grabbed the back of my head and forced me to lick it. That's when I realized she didn't see me as a child — she saw me as less than human."

Soberano also recounted nights when she was locked in the garage without food, and threatened that her little brother would be stuffed in the freezer if she made noise. She described the manipulation that kept her silent: "Whenever the social worker was about to visit, she'd suddenly be kind. She'd give me candy, tell me she loved me. So when asked, I'd lie and say everything was fine."

But the truth eventually surfaced. During one surprise visit, the social worker found Liza malnourished, her stomach bloated from days without food, her body marked by bruises. "That's when I stopped lying to protect her," Liza said.

Reflecting on her early life, the actress admitted that the abuse left deep psychological imprints. "I developed this habit of making myself small out of fear of being a burden," she explained. "I tolerated disrespect and abuse because I was afraid of losing people who were never afraid of losing me."

Despite the trauma, Soberano credits her grandparents in California for eventually rescuing her and her brother, providing them with stability before they were sent to live with their father in the Philippines. Still, she says

the scars of childhood made her vulnerable even in her later relationships and career.

The courage to finally speak came, she said, from a desire to release herself from shame. "I never feel like anybody actually listens to me, even when I'm crying for help," she confessed. "But I want people to know: don't tolerate abuse. Don't stay silent because you're afraid of rocking the boat. Love yourself first."

Her story has since sparked an outpouring of support online, with fans and fellow celebrities praising her bravery for breaking the silence. By revisiting the darkest chapters of her past, Liza Soberano has turned personal pain into a powerful reminder: even stars can carry invisible wounds, and speaking out can be the first step toward healing.

Kris Aquino hospitalized anew after 'alarming' blood test results

Kris Aquino revealed she has been confined at a hospital to undergo several tests due to her "alarming" blood panel results.

Through her Instagram page on Tuesday, Aug. 19, Aquino showed herself lying in the hospital bed, speaking to a medical staff while her youngest son Bimby was sleeping in a bed beside her.

"I came in for the second dose of my Rituximab. I was prepared in the sense that we already knew all the protocols we would all need to follow. I have to give a big shoutout to [Dr. Geraldine Zamora] because she saw something in my blood panel results that she found alarming," she said.

"She convinced me to have an ultrasound done yesterday; with all my hospitalizations, I can already tell that I should be worried when the senior technician comes in," she continued.

Aside from undergoing an ultrasound and other medical tests, Aquino—who has been diagnosed with 11 autoimmune diseases—had seen three specialists who explained "how important it was to not delay because I would be endangering my life further."

"Doctor NC told me that he doesn't do procedures unless they are necessary but this is something all my

doctors discussed—why does Kris Aquino get these difficult to detect possible health time bombs not once but twice in her lifetime and because of the first, we now all know she's allergic to all blood thinners," she stated.

"I had the non-invasive option explained to me, but I chose to literally trust Filipino doctors with my life rather than take medicine that I am unsure of especially because I just finished a big dose of a strong immunosuppressant and I am continuing with two immunosuppressants and so much more supplements, antihistamines, and important vitamins," she added.

Aquino then appealed for prayers for her and the medical staff who have been caring for her.

"Wag sana kayo4 sumuko sa pagdasal dahil kumukuha ako ng lakas galing sa kabutihang loob ninyo," she concluded. (Please don't give up on praying for me because I draw strength from your kindness.)

Carney, Trump talk 'new' trade and security relationship

Prime Minister Mark Carney and U.S. President Donald Trump had a "productive and wide-ranging conversation" on Thursday, according to a readout from the Prime Minister's Office.

The two discussed trade and "a new economic and security relationship." They also spoke about "long-term peace" in Ukraine and Europe and agreed to meet again soon.

Senior government sources tell CTV News that Carney was the one who initiated the call and described the conversation as "lengthy" and "substantive."

The conversation comes amid an ongoing and protracted trade war between Canada and the United States, and three weeks after the two countries blew past a self-imposed deadline to reach a new economic and security deal.

Trump launched the trade war in February with an initial slate of sweeping tariffs, which he said was in response to border concerns, accusing Canada of allowing fentanyl to cross into the United States.

On Aug. 1, when Carney and Trump failed to reach a new deal, the U.S. president increased levies to 35 per cent tariffs on Canadian goods. Most products are, however, exempt from the levies because of the free trade deal between the two countries.

Trump has also imposed global sectoral tariffs on steel, aluminum, copper and automobiles, to which Canadian goods are subject without carve-outs.

Canada also has a series of

Several provinces, meanwhile, have removed U.S. alcohol from liquor store shelves, and Canadians en masse have reduced travel south of the border. Trump and his team have criticized those actions, according to U.S. Ambassador to Canada Pete Hoekstra, calling the country "nasty" to deal with.

Thursday's discussion between Trump and Carney is the latest in ongoing negotiations between the two countries in the hopes of inking a new economic and security deal, with several Canadian lawmakers making the trip to Washington to meet with

The free trade agreement between Canada, the U.S., and Mexico, is also up for review in 2026. **Anand meets with Rubio**Canada's Foreign Affairs Minister Anita Anand, meanwhile, met with her U.S. counterpart, Secretary of State Marco Rubio on Thursday.

Anand and Rubio's meeting covered negotiations to end the Russia-Ukraine war, as well as Haiti's security and overcoming "Hamas's ongoing obstruction of peace in Gaza," according to a summary from the U.S. Department of State.

Also on Thursday, Anand joined 20 other foreign ministers from Europe, Australia, Japan and the United Kingdom to condemn Israel for approving a settlement project in the occupied West Bank.

Air Canada strike ends after tentative deal reached with flight attendants' union

TORONTO — Air Canada says it plans to operate more than half of its scheduled flights Tuesday after reaching a tentative deal with the union representing its flight attendants to end a strike that began Saturday morning.

The airline said it will gradually restart its operations Tuesday, with the first of its mainline aircraft resuming takeoffs around 4 p.m. ET.

By the end of the day, it plans to complete 53 per cent of scheduled flights — under the Air Canada, Air Canada Rouge and Air Canada Express banners — with a focus on international outbounds. The ramp-up will begin "in earnest" Wednesday morning for mainline North American routes, said Air Canada executive vice-president and chief operations officer Mark Nasr in an interview

.We are deeply apologetic to our customers and right now we're focused on making it right and getting them on their way," said Nasr.

"When customers buy a ticket on Air Canada, they rely on the brand. We're making a promise and we failed to live up to that promise, plain and simple. We're going to re-earn that trust and it's going to start right now ... by getting the planes back in the sky."

The airline has cautioned that a return to full, regular service would take seven to 10 days as aircraft and

Quebec short more than 4,000 teachers as school year set to begin

minister says half of those have a bachelor's degree

Quebec Education Minister Bernard Drainville says there are still 4,115 teaching positions to be filled in the province's schools, with just a little over two weeks before the new school year begins.

"So 96 per cent of classrooms the French school service centres and the English-language school boards Air Canada and the flight were working on recruiting the remaining four per cent.

10% of teachers unqualified, but Quebec Provincial Association of Teachers, said that is a concern.

> "One in 10 teachers in Quebec is not a teacher," she said, "And we shouldn't be calling them teachers. They are unqualified personnel."

> While Yetman applauds them for stepping up and walking into the classroom, saying they are desperately needed, having unqualified staff adds extra pressure on qualified teachers who need to support them.

> She also noted that student learning is impacted, because unqualified personnel don't know pedagogy.

> "They don't know how to teach reading and writing, for example," Yetman said.

> She also said that while the number of open teaching positions needing to be filled may have dropped this year, more context is needed, such as how many total positions there are this year compared to last.

> What is known, Yetman said, is that the number of vacant positions this year is "still concerning."

> She referred to the situation not as a teacher shortage, but rather a "retention and recruitment crisis."

> "There are teachers out there who have decided not to teach," she said, adding that 20 to 30 per cent of teachers entering the profession leave within the first five years.

> "So we shouldn't really be talking about a shortage of teachers. We should be talking about a shortage of good working conditions, a shortage of resources for students, a shortage of respect for the profession."

> Yetman says an example of that disrespect is the Quebec government announcing \$570 million in cuts to the province's education system, blaming school boards and school service centres for going over budget.

> "Blaming education for the deficit in Quebec is a really big error," she said. The government has since added \$540 million to the budget, but with conditions.

> In terms of support staff, such as special education technicians and professionals, including speech therapists, school psychologists and others, the number of positions to be filled remains unknown at this time.

> Drainville said recruitment for those positions is ongoing and that data will be released at the end of August.
