Latest tragic news show increasing dangers from climate change impacts

What happened in Texas on July 4 is just one of various examples of tragedies that the warming of the planet has dangerous impacts on everything on earth. News reports are not yet clear whether or not a proper weather warning was issued and if this tragedy was caused by the various cuts of the current government. The latest reports indicate that the Texas

flood death toll has risen to at least 134, with 101 people still missing. The flooding primarily impacted the Texas Hill Country, including Kerr County. Search and rescue operations are ongoing, but have been hampered by further heavy rains and difficult conditions.

Meanwhile, authorities leading the search for victims of the devastating flooding in Texas deflected intensifying questions on Tuesday about who was responsible for monitoring the weather and warning that flash floods were barrelling toward camps and homes.

Local officials in Kerr County, where searchers have found 87 bodies, said their priority is finding victims, not reviewing what happened

in the hours before the floods inundated the state's Hill Country.

During a sometimes tense news conference, officials faced questions about how quickly they responded and who was in charge.

"Right now, this team up here is focused on bringing people home,"



The head of a Christian girls' camp in Texas, where 27 campers were killed during flash flooding, waited more than an hour after receiving a severe flood warning to evacuation proceedings, according to the Guardian.

Richard Eastland, 70, who ran Camp Mystic with his family since the 1980s, was among those killed after the camp was overwhelmed and devastated by powerful floodwaters on July 4. The camp was located beside the Guadalupe River.

A family spokesperson for the destroyed camp, Jeff Carr, told the Washington Post that Eastland received an emergency message on his phone from the National Weather Service at 1:14 a.m., alerting him of life-threatening flash flooding. Carr said Eastland didn't make the decision to begin evacuations until 2:30 a.m., and by that time, heavy rains had begun and water levels had risen significantly.

At the time of the disaster, almost 700 girls were boarding at the camp. Two teenage counsellors had previously revealed to The Guardian that staff and campers were made to hand in their phones for the duration of their stay, meaning none of them had received news of the flood warnings

.According to Carr, Eastland spent some time after receiving the alert conferring with family members about what course of action to take, some of whom lived on the 725-acre grounds. The Washington Post said the emergency alert did not contain an evacuation order — a procedure that falls under the local government's jurisdiction.

Carr explained that staff

communicated over walkie-talkies until Eastland decided the situation had become critical, particularly for the dormitories closest to the riverbank, which housed Camp Mystic's youngest attendees.

Eastland was killed while trying to evacuate a group of young girls in his truck, Carr said. Many of the counsellors in charge of the dorms were teenagers and were left to make life-altering decisions without the guidance of adults, the Washington Post said.

Carr said his family decided to share the details to silence speculation about the turn of events.

"It will be important to go through this process and avoid sharing information on a piecemeal basis," he told the media outlet after a family meeting on Sunday.

While some decisions made by camp staff have been explained, questions remain.

In some areas, searches for the missing were paused on Sunday and Monday over fears of more rain and flash flooding.

During Kerr County commission meeting on Monday, officials shared new details about the scale of the disaster.

"We've heard accounts of trailer after trailer after trailer being swept into the river with families in them. [We] can't find the trailers, we don't know how many of them there are," the county judge, Rob Kelly, said, adding that one trailer was found buried in gravel 27 feet below the surface of the river.

Crews are using sonar to search the river and local lakes for more vehicles, and are draining two reservoirs connected to the river as part of the search, officials confirmed.

According to CNN, the Kerr County sheriff, Larry Leitha, told reporters that recovery efforts could take up to six months.

Quebec adds \$540 million back to schools after nationwide protests

July 16, 2025 - The Quebec government is adding hundreds of millions of dollars to the education budget for the upcoming school year after coming under fire for announcing cuts that would have amounted to \$570 million less in funding.

The sum of money announced on Wednesday amounts to \$540 million.

When announcing budgetary restrictions last month, Education Minister Bernard Drainville said it was up to school service centres and school boards to respect the budgets they were given.

Since then, teachers, parents, unions, school staff and school boards have heavily criticized those budgetary restrictions, arguing that student success and services would be affected.

Across the province, there were protests and news conferences to draw attention to their concerns.

In a statement on Wednesday, Drainville said the government had listened to people's concerns and was

taking action for students.

But the funding comes with conditions.

"All the money invested must for anything else. Let's be clear: this is school network. not an open bar," read Drainville's

statement.

"Of \$540 million the announced today, \$425 million will be paid into a dedicated envelope. To qualify, each [service centre] will have to demonstrate that it has made efforts to reduce its administrative expenses." He hopes that a spending review already underway will continue and lead to savings.

Decision offers some comfort. but some are still cautious. Mélanie Laviolette, head of the Fédération des comités de parents du Québec, Quebec's parent committee federation, says the news brings a "certain relief."

budget was announced last March that the sums allocated were insufficient to meet the rising costs of the system. So how is it that now, in the last month, the minister has turned on the lights?" she asked.

"We're not opening a bottle of champagne today because, for me, a minister who needs such a mobilization of citizens to reverse a decision that was obvious from the start ... it raises certain questions."

Parti Québécois MNA Pascal Bérubé, sponsored a petition launched on the National Assembly website to oppose these budget cuts. It gathered over 157,000 signatures.

He says while this update is "good," it is important to not "take any chances."

"Let's keep signing this petition so that it reaches a record level this fall. There is no confirmation yet that all the measures taken in the school service centres will be cancelled," said Bérubé

The two sides of the debate about genocide in Gaza

The question of whether or not Israel can be accused of committing genocide in Gaza is a verv controversial topic Perhaps, the opinions of newspaper editors, reporters and advocacy groups, both Jewish and non-Jewish, have strong arguments to support their points of view, however, for many people who read the news or watch TV, the daily death tolls and starvation happening in Gaza are difficult to ignore as they appear to be instances and examples of genocide.

The word genocide originates from Greek, genos which means race, and cide from Latin which translates to killing. A Polish Jewish lawyer, Rafael Lemkin, introduced genocide as a crime in international law and was responsible to have it recognized to be included in an international agreement in 1948 among 153 states that included the U.S. and Israel.

As the Al Jazeera newspaper pointed out, "Officials, experts and activists have used various terms to describe Israel's destruction of Gaza. But what do they mean?

"For all of the condemnation of Israel's actions, there is also strong opposition to Israel's actions being labeled a genocide. Where does this push back come from? ...The opposition is from Israel, which has never accepted claims that it has committed atrocities—claims which have been made for decades for its actions as an occupier of Palestinian territory-and repudiates charges of war crimes and genocide. Israel has

almost unconditional backing from the United States, and has military and other support from the United States, United Kingdom, Germany, and a few other Western states. The United States and the United Kingdom have condemned claims of genocide against Israeli leaders, including the orders of the ICJ and the ICC seeking arrest warrants."

Since the day Hamas made a surprise attack on Israel on October 7, 2023, killing 1139 Israelis and abducting more than 200 hostages, news reports on the civilian casualties and the destruction of homes, hospitals, schools are explained by stating that Israel has a right to defend itself and that Hamas is using hospitals as a cover and using civilians as their

United Nations expert Francesca Albanese has slammed the decision by the United States to sanction her as "obscene", saying she is being targeted for calling out Israel's genocide in Gaza. Albanese, who serves as the UN's special rapporteur on the occupied Palestinian territory, said she would not be cowed into silence by the US move against her.

While announcing sanctions on Wednesday, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio charged Albanese with waging a "campaign of political and economic warfare against the United States and Israel."

The UN rapporteur hit back on Thursday, noting that the atrocities being committed in Gaza were not just down to "the unrelinquished territorial

ambitions of Israel" and the backing of its supporters but also "companies who are profiting from it." This statement is related to a local protest group that sent a press release to this paper, citing the fact that they are against the investment of a big Quebec corporation in Israel's war in the Gaza strip.

The sanctions against Albanese by the U.S. government are considered a "dangerous precedent" by Stephane Dujarric, spokesperson of the UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres. According to the Guardian, "The US sanctions are the culmination of an extraordinary and sprawling campaign of nearly six months by the Trump administration to quell criticism of Israel's handling of the deadly war in Gaza. Earlier this year, the Trump administration began arresting and deporting faculty and students of American universities who participated in pro-Palestinian demonstrations and other political activities."

With these news reports, it is quite worrisome for journalists to even discuss genocide in Gaza but it seems necessary to voice our concern on what is going on in that small part of the world where its citizens are suffering.

UN rapporteur Albanese has given us an example not to be silenced by power but our conscience should lead us not to stand idly by. Instead concerned people must voice their opposition to what this continuous bombardment of Gaza means. We do not wish to let history repeat itself when the world stood by as the Holocaust was happening in Nazi Germay between 1933-1945 when millions of Jews were exterminated. It was the Philippine Commonwealth President Quezon who showed his humanity to allow 1200 Jews to settle in the country when no other country wanted to offer them any refuge from their persecutors.

As UN human rights experts pointed out, we are in a moral crossroads - "do we all agree to do something to end the unfolding genocide or watch it end life in Gaza?"

Following World War I, the League of Nations granted the British a mandate over Palestine, which included the territory of what is now Israel, Jordan, and the Gaza Strip.


Establishment of Israel:



Dollard-des-Ormeaux Finalizes Zoning By-Law

The City of Dollard-des-Ormeaux has officially adopted a significant revision to its Urban Planning Programme and Zoning By-law, marking the most comprehensive update to its urban development strategy in decades.

The revised Urban Planning Programme (By-law R-2024-190) came into effect on April 24, 2025, while the

new Zoning By-law (By-law R-2025-199) was enacted on May 16, 2025. The introduces modernized update guidelines for land use, sustainable development, transportation, and residential zoning, all aimed at shaping the city's future while preserving the character of its neighborhoods.

"This update reflects years of careful planning and extensive community engagement," said Mayor Alex Bottausci. "It's a blueprint for responsible growth that puts residents first."

A Collaborative Process

The changes are the result of a long-term public consultation process that began in 2019, involving surveys, webinars, public consultations, open houses, and review panels. Community feedback played a central role in shaping both by-laws, reinforcing the city's commitment totransparency and citizen involvement.

Residents expressed priorities around traffic flow, green spaces, building density, and the preservation of the suburban character of Dollard-des-Ormeaux. In response, the final plan

balanced emphasizes urban development, improved pedestrian and cycling infrastructure, and

controlled densification in targeted

tection of green spaces and integration of eco-friendly development principles.

Standards: Architectural guidelines for construction aesthetics, height limits, and neighborhood consistency.

New Zoning By-law in Effect

The Zoning By-law, which translates the planning programme into enforceable rules, includes

updated zone maps, building regulations, and usage definitions. Developers and homeowners

must now follow the new standards for any construction, renovation, or land use

Planning Director Jean-Philippe St-Arnaud noted that the zoning reforms provide "the regulatory

foundation to ensure the urban plan's vision becomes a reality."

What's Next?

The city has made both documents publicly accessible on its official website. Information sessions and resources will also be offered to help residents and developers understand how the new regulations apply to them.

"With these tools now in place," said Mayor Bottausci, "we are better equipped than ever to guide growth, protect our environment, and enhance quality of life.

Month-long Filipino Heritage Celebrations

June is a very special and busy month for people of Filipino ancestry in Canada. Officially, June has been declared "Filipino Heritage Month" across Canada. As tradition dictates, people of Filipino descent, numbering 957,355 in Canada (according to the Canadian Census 2021), celebrate "Ang Buwan ng Hunyo" with much fanfare, festivities, salient Philippine cultural themes and historic events which are generally the communities' means of commemorations from coast to coast.

In Ontario, where 363,6555 Filipinos live, they have been celebrating three important events in the same month - on June 12th, Philippine Independence Day, on June 19th, the anniversary of Dr. Jose Rizal's birth, and the end-of-schoolyear summer break for school children. These traditional activities, since the Filipino diaspora in the 1950s, have been organized, expanded and delivered in different modes of celebration. Remarkably, the events have evolved from a "past single, coordinated and big tent gathering" to numerous independent, separate but focused and related public celebrations in various cities and towns in the province.

Upon several official proclamations of Filipino Heritage Month in the City of Toronto in November 2017 (via Councillor Neethan Shan and the late community leader Paulina Corpuz' proposals), across the country in October 2018 (through Motion 155 by MP Salma Zahid), and the province of Ontario in May 2021 (Bill 217 by MPP Doly Begum), June became a month-long celebration involving multi-events and festivities engaging Filipinos and non-Filipinos by highlighting the vibrant Filipino culture, heritage and history including Filipino contributions and achievements in the socio-economic landscape of Canada.

In the Greater Toronto Area (GTA), several high-profile community organizations and entities celebrated June 2025 in various historic, purposeful and meaningful activities. These events included:

The Filipino Centre Toronto (FCT), on June 1, 2025, held its "Pistahan Sa Toronto" at the FCT site with FCT President & CEO MaryAnn S. San Juan, Board Chair Efren de Villa and Board Director Philip Beloso leading the festivities. Minister and MPP Raymond Cho, MPP Aris Babikian, MP for Agincourt Jean Yip graced the daylong celebration, together with other Fil-Can community members and their families.

PIDC kicked off on June 7, 2025, with a salo-salo morning picnic at Earl Bales Park, North York and wreath-laying at the statue of the Philippine national hero, Dr. Jose Rizal, in celebration of his 164th birth anniversary. Those who attended were MP and Minister Rechie Valdez, Philippine Consul General in Toronto Angelica Escalona, MP Roman Baber, MPP and Solicitor General Michael Kerzner,

Philippine Consul Rodney Sumague and CMC-AO President Tulsi Dharel. The event's lead organizers were Tom Tan, Agnes Miranda, Ben Corpuz, Karen Binaday, and Melinda Manlapaz, assisted by other PIDC officers and volunteers..



Floods in Montreal will happen again. Maybe soon. What can we do about it?

Eva Szymkowiak was among the Montrealers starting the week dealing with the aftermath of a storm that dumped more than 70 millimetres of rain over the city in just a few hours.

For the second time in just under a year, the longtime resident of Montreal's Saint-Laurent borough, says her building's parking garage on Thimens Street was completely flooded.

Last year, she says both their vehicles were ruined in a flood. But on Sunday, Szymkowiak says they saw the water accumulating from the storm and she luckily had time to move her car and warn others in the building.

One neighbour described seeing the manhole covers on the street being blown off and the water making its way into the building through the indoor garage. "Somehow this street doesn't absorb [...] huge amounts of water," Szymkowiak said.

Szymkowiak and her neighbour are hoping the city steps up to fix the problem. Faced with repeated flooding across multiple boroughs, officials are attempting to find longterm solutions — some even introducing bylaws designed to mitigate flood risk and exposure.

'Every neighbourhood, every street is different,' says mayor Montreal Mayor Valérie Plante visited those impacted by flooding in the city's Ahuntsic-Cartierville borough Monday.

"There isn't a unique solution for the entire territory," she said. "Every neighbourhood, every street is different."

She pointed to various initiatives being carried out by the city to reduce the impact of flooding, including overhauling the sewer infrastructure in high-priority areas and building green infrastructure, such as sponge parks and retention basins.

Maja Vodanovic, the executive committee member responsible for water, said several criteria help determine which areas are high priority, including the number of people affected in an area, whether it's in a low-lying area or prone to flooding.

Overhauling sewage network not the solution, says expert Jean-Luc Martel, a professor in the construction and engineering department at the École de technologie supérieur in Montreal, said tnere is oπen a lot of emphasis placed on the need to redo the sewer network.

But retrofitting the sewage network as a whole would be expensive, he says. In some cases, putting in bigger pipes would just displace the problem by moving the water downstream.

"It's not a question of the size and the capacity of the sewer network.

They're not designed to deal with those job."

Are basement living spaces a good idea in Quebec after widespread flooding?

That can include using events," said Martel. "That's not [its] waterproof materials like ceramic tiles in flood-prone basements, or installing watertight garage doors, says Maja Vodanovic, the executive committee member.



property owners to level up their inclined driveways. It's also put in place a measure that prohibits basements to be used for certain purposes.

To mitigate flooding, boroughs have to look at what's happening at the simpler for those kind of projects to go surface, says Martel, and reduce the amount of runoff making its way into storm sewers to avoid overwhelming the network.

Green infrastructure can help. He says homeowners can also do their part by having rain gardens and disconnecting gutters to allow the water to be absorbed by the lawn.

Ultimately, though, Martel says the main issue are basements.

"We need to really question ourselves as a society. Do we need basements?" said Martel.

"After the sewer is full, the water stays on the surface and then it goes with gravity. It goes to the lowest point," he said.

Mitigating flood risk and exposure

With the intensity and frequency of extreme rain set to increase, the City of Montreal says it wants to make it easier for homeowners to make changes to create a more resilient home.

"We want to make it more through. We are working on changing our regulations to streamline those projects," Vodanovic said.

> Regardless the

neighbourhood, or borough, the city of Montreal said its RénoPlex program, for buildings with one to five dwellings, provides financial assistance to homeowners for renovations or flood protection work on their property.

The borough of Saint-Laurent has taken action and adopted a new bylaw last month which will allow homeowners to level up downward sloping garage entrances.

It also outlines conditions for parking lot layouts and states that new driveways should be designed in a way to prevent rainwater from flowing onto private property.But the borough isn't quite ready to remove basements from the equation.

Citing the ongoing housing crisis, it said in a news release, the borough will continue to allow for dwellings in basements, even in new constructions, provided "flooding risks are reduced to a minimum."

Borough Mayor Alan DeSousa, says basement usage for daycare centres and seniors' residences will be limited.

"If kids are in the basement doing activities and water comes very quickly those kids are vulnerable," he said.

Other boroughs have different rules.

Rosemont-La Petite-Patrie, is taking a tougher stance and is not allowing the construction of 100 per cent basement dwellings anywhere on its territory, except through special exemptions for large-scale projects that benefit the community and meet criteria ensuring resiliency.

Homeowners, however, will be allowed, under certain conditions, to expand the living area of their home by developing an underground living space. Basement use will continue to be allowed for things like garbage storage, laundry rooms, and parking areas.



58th ASEAN summit held July 8-11, 2025 in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia

Ministers' Meeting (AMM) was held on 9 July 2025, in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. The Meeting was chaired by Malaysia under the theme "Inclusivity and Sustainability".

The Meeting was opened by The Honourable Dato' Seri Anwar Ibrahim, Prime Minister of Malaysia. In his remarks, Prime Minister Anwar highlighted ASEAN's strength in its habits of cooperation and its willingness to keep engaging. He emphasised that ASEAN is a region that charts its own course deliberately, coherently, and with purpose. Prime Minister Anwar underlined the principle of Centrality as ASEAN's guiding principle, which is crucial for maintaining the region's role as the primary anchor for dialogue and ensuring external partners continue to find value in engaging with ASEAN. In line with the ASEAN 2045: Our Shared Future, he called for greater synergy across pillars and sectors, and proposed for ASEAN Foreign Ministers and ASEAN Economic Ministers to move in concert in facing challenges. He underscored the importance of fortifying ASEAN's internal foundations,

The 58th ASEAN Foreign by increasing intra-ASEAN trade and investment and advancing integration across sectors. the first in-person talks by the countries' top diplomats since President Donald Trump returned to the White House in January.

What did Rubio say after meeting Wang?

"I thought it was [a] very constructive and positive meeting," Rubio said.

The meeting between the two marks one of the highest-level engagements between the US and China since President Donald Trump returned to office in January

Most countries will likely have to accept some baseline tariff rate on their goods by the United States, Prime Minister Mark Carney signalled Tuesday morning, on his way into a meeting with his cabinet on Parliament Hill.

"There is not much evidence at the moment — from the deals, agreements and negotiations with the Americans, for any country or any jurisdiction — to get a deal without tariffs," Carney said in French, when asked whether he believes it's possible to have the levies removed entirely.

Canada, he added, is uniquely positioned to have effectively free trade with the United States.

A slate of stacked U.S. tariffs on Canadian goods, as well as Canadian countermeasures, have been in place for months.

Following the G7 summit in Kananaskis, Alta., last month, Carney signalled he and U.S. President Donald Trump agreed to iron out a trade deal before July 21. But, in a letter addressed to Carney and posted to Truth Social last week, Trump said he'll be hitting Canada with 35 per cent tariffs on Canadian products starting Aug. 1. Carney subsequently revised the deadline to reach a deal to that

Carney also told reporters before Tuesday's cabinet meeting that he expects talks with the United States will "intensify" in the next few weeks.

"At the same time, we need to recognize that the commercial landscape globally has changed," he said. "It has changed in a fundamental manner, and we will continue to focus on what we can most control, which is

China has agreed to sign a Southeast Asian treaty banning nuclear weapons. Malavsia's and China's foreign ministers confirmed, in a move that seeks to shield the area from rising

global security tensions amid the threat of imminent United States tariffs.

The pledge from Beijing was welcomed as diplomats on Thursday gathered for the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) foreign ministers' meeting, where US Secretary of State Marco Rubio is also due to meet regional counterparts and Russian counterpart Sergey Lavrov. building a strong Canadian economy. It's part of what we'll be discussing at cabinet today."

The prime minister added that the situation needs to be "stabilized," especially for the sectors that are particularly affected by Trump's tariffs.

Carney is also set to meet with Canada's premiers in Huntsville, Ont., next week.

In a post on social media Tuesday afternoon, Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre criticized Carney for conceding that a fully tarifffree deal with Trump may not be possible.

Another unilateral concession from a man who said he would never back down to the U.S. president," he wrote.

Also in a statement Tuesday, NDP interim leader Don Davies wrote: "Conceding to a bully never ends."

"That is why New Democrats urge the Carney government to cease offering unilateral concessions without securing reciprocal benefits from the U.S.," he added.

Carney comments a 'wake-up call': trade lawyer

William Pellerin, international trade lawyer with McMillan and former litigator for Canada in trade disputes with the United States, said Carney's comments on Tuesday can serve as a "bit of a wake-up call for Canadians and Canadian businesses that we might not get back to a place of no tariffs."

Speaking to CTV News, Pellerin said businesses should prepare for that to be the case.

Pellerin said there is "a lot of scenario planning" underway for Canadian businesses and industry, while Carney's comments could be "laying the groundwork or setting expectations" for Canadians.

"I think there's still quite a bit of optimism and hope that we will get to a reasonable place with the United States as our, by far, largest trading partner," he said. "But today might have been kind of the first opening, or the first time that we've really heard that we might not get there."

Speaking to reporters earlier on Tuesday, Carney indicated Canada has one of the lowest effective tariff rates compared to other countries. According to Pellerin, Canada is "actually not doing teribly."

He said while there are some sectors that have been hit with more punishing tariffs — such as steel and aluminum — the vast majority of goods being compliant with the Canada-U.S.-Mexico free trade agreement brings the average, or effective, tariff rate down.

"If Canada could get to a place where we have just a very low baseline tariff that applies only to a certain subsect of products, I think we could be OK," Pellerin said. "But certainly, right now, the steel industry and others are really suffering."



This coconut lime tofu dish tastes like vacation in a bowl. With fragrant jasmine rice and a rich, tangy sauce,

1½ cups jasmine rice, dry For the tofu

375 gram extra firm tofu, 1 block, cubed

1 tbsp avocado oil, or olive oil, divided

1 tbsp soy sauce, divided

1 tbsp cornstarch

For the sauce

1 tbsp avocado oil, or olive oil

1 shallot, diced

1 thumb ginger, minced

3 cloves garlic, minced

13.5 oz full fat coconut milk, 1 can

1 tbsp soy sauce

1 tsp maple syrup

1 tsp paprika

2 limes, juiced

To garnish

1 handful cilantro, chopped

Instructions

Cook the rice according to package directions.

Preheat the oven to 400F and prepare a baking sheet with parchment.

To a bowl, toss the tofu in one tablespoon of the oil, soy sauce and cornstarch until evenly coated. Bake for 20 minutes, until crispy.

In the meantime, to a pan over medium heat, add the other tablespoon of oil, shallot, ginger and garlic. Saute for 1 to 2 minutes, until

The death toll of Palestinians killed near GHF aid hubs has now reached nearly 700, according to United Nations figures released on Tuesday

The GHF claimed the stampede, which took place on its distribution hub in Khan Younis, was intentionally caused by agitators in the crowd. The organization reported 19 people were trampled and one person was fatally stabbed during what it described as a "chaotic and dangerous surge."

"We have credible reason to believe that elements within the crowd - armed and affiliated with Hamas deliberately fomented the unrest," GHF said, adding that it recovered at least one firearm during the incident.

Gaza's Health Ministry disputed GHF's version of events of what prompted the stampede, calling the statement "false and misleading."

"This crime claimed the lives of 21 martyrs this morning, including 15 who died from suffocation and six who were shot with live ammunition, in addition to many others who were injured," the Health Ministry statement read.

The ministry also accused GHF of operating outside humanitarian norms, saying it "does not adhere to any professional or ethical standards of humanitarian work."

The Health Ministry has alleged that GHF staff, which consists of armed private security personnel, and Israel Defense Forces (IDF) have fired directly upon people collecting aid.

TIME has reached out to the GHF and the IDF for comment. The Israeli military has declined to comment publicly on the incident, referring questions back to the

foundation.

Witnesses said guards at the site used pepper spray after locking the gates, trapping people between the gates and the perimeter fence. Other reports from the scene allege that access to the aid center was delayed or blocked, causing panic among those gathered.

"People kept gathering and pressuring each other; when people pushed each other...those who couldn't stand fell under the people and were crushed," Mahmoud Fojo told Reuters." Some people started jumping over the netted fence and got wounded. We were injured, and God saved us. We were under the people and we said the Shahada (death prayers). We thought we were dying, finished," the eyewitness continued.

In a response to the New York Times, the organization said it had used a "limited" amount of pepper spray, but "only to safeguard additional loss of life."

GHF and its distribution sites have come under heavy criticism since operations began in May. The day after aid hubs in Gaza opened, one Palestinian was killed and another 48 injured, which appeared to be as a result of Israeli gunfire according to the U.N.

Critics have also raised concerns that the placement of GHF aid centers, mostly in southern and central Gaza, may be contributing to the long-term displacement of civilians from the north, where Israeli military operations have continued.

Despite the scale of distribution, the UN has warned that aid provided through GHF represents only a fraction of what is needed to stave off starvation for Gaza's population of more than two million.

Dates for the ceremonies have yet to be finalized, but honorees have up to two years to schedule their star unveilings.

A celebrated figure in musical theater, Lea rose to global prominence through her role in Miss Saigon and lent her voice to Disney's Jasmine in Aladdin and Mulan. Most recently, she appeared in Stephen Sondheim's Old Friends on Broadway, earning a 2025 Drama League Awards nomination for Distinguished Performance.

Lolit added that she has learned from her past mistakes. 'Kung ano man yung mga mistakes na nagawa mo nun, nakadagdag yun sa wisdom mo ngayon,' she said. (Whatever mistakes you made then, those added to your wisdom now.)'

At media conferences, Lolit was always early to arrive. In showbiz gatherings, Lolit always reminded fellow young writers and editors to be punctual and not to fight unless they were the ones who started the trouble.

A certified dog lover, Lolit said that she loves watching K-dramas. She said that love songs and Christmas tunes make her cry. 'Kapag nakakarinig ako ng love songs at Christmas songs naiiyak ako. Iyakin talaga ako.'

Lolit took up political science at the University of the Philippines in Diliman, Quezon City, but did not complete her college education.

But before she became a showbiz columnist, she covered the police beat under popular columnist Ruther Batuigas. Then she joined showbiz under former talent manager Douglas Quijano, who Regal Films later hired.

Lolit gave a final full-length interview for Rolling Stones Philippines magazine in May. .

Final post

In one of her final posts on Instagram, Lolit shared that she was hospitalized at Far Eastern University Hospital due to a kidney infection. She had also been undergoing involved in the Metro Manila Film Festival Awards Night scam, where the winners were switched. At the height of the scandal, which almost ruined her career, she revealed that she had tried to commit suicide.

'When you reach a certain point in life, it sometimes feels like there's no more point to go on. Mabuti pa kaya matulog na lang ako forever,' said Nay Lolit in an interview with veteran entertainment host Aster Amoyo for her online show TickTALK with Aster Amoyo, uploaded on YouTube in 2022.

But Lolit said she did not pursue it.
