Historical perspectives and insights to illuminate the Filipino cultural heritage and identity

In celebrating Filipino Heritage Month and Philippine Independence Day, it is important to remember what makes Filipinos different from other Asian nations and why they are proud of their identity and cultural heritage. Like most immigrants, the primary reason Filipinos go to another country is for economic opportunities and better financial prospects. Many seek higher salaries and more stable employment than what is available in the Philippines, leading them to work as Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs). This migration is often driven by the desire to improve their living standards and provide for their families, including sending remittances back home. In fact, these remittances are a major contribution to the Philippine economy.

The cultural identity of Filipinos is a complex blend of maintaining traditional practices while adapting to a new environment including active participation in community organizations, preserving language, and engaging in cultural events and celebrations. However, Filipinos also face challenges such as navigating stereotypes and discrimination, which can impact their sense of belonging and identity.

About 86 to 87 percent of the Philippine population belong to the 19 ethnolinguistic groups which are classified as neither indigenous nor

moro, known simply as Filipinos. These groups are sometimes collectively referred to as "Lowland Christianized groups" to distinguish them from the other ethnolinguistic groups. The most populous of these groups, with populations exceeding a million individuals, are the Ilocano, the Pangasinense, the Kapampangan, the Tagalog, the Ivatan, the Cuyonon, the Bicolano, the Visayans (Cebuanos, Boholano, the Hiligaynon/Ilonggo, and Waray) and many more. These groups converted to Christianity and was part of the Spanish empire, particularly both the native and migrant lowland-coastal groups, and adopted foreign elements of culture throughout the country's history.

Due to the history of the Philippines since the Spanish colonial era, there are also some historical migrant heritage groups within the lowland Filipino populations such as the Chinese Filipinos and Spanish Filipinos, both of whom intermixed with the above lowland Austronesian-speaking ethnic groups, which produced Filipino Mestizos. These groups also comprise contribute a considerable proportion of the country's population, especially its elite group and were integral to the establishment of the country from the rise of Filipino nationalism by the Ilustrado intelligentsia to the Philippine Revolution. Other peoples of migrant and/or mixed

descent include American Filipinos, Indian Filipinos, Japanese Filipinos, and many more.

Given the diversity of the Philippines, the unifying element of Filipino culture is a complex matter. A sense of national identity emerged out of the long standing struggle for

independence. In contemporary Philippines, many Filipinos are acutely aware of the colonial history of their country. For example, José Rizal, a national hero in the struggle for Philippine independence, is a highly

Understanding carbon emissions and the effects on climate change

We often read the news about carbon emissions and how they impact climate change but does everyone really understand how they are produced and what we can do about reducing them? Perhaps, most people have an idea but the problem is that it is difficult to break habits that appear to be harmless but they are daily human activities which cause varying degrees of carbon emissions.

The majority of carbon emissions, around 75-80%, stem from the burning of fossil fuels (coal, oil, and gas) for electricity, heat, and transportation. Industrial processes also contribute significantly to these emissions. A more detailed breakdown is listed below:

Fossil Fuel Combustion:

This is the largest source of carbon emissions, primarily from electricity and heat production, industrial transportation, and processes.

Electricity & Heat Production:

The burning of fossil fuels to generate electricity and provide heat accounts for a substantial portion of global emissions.

Transportation:

Emissions from vehicles (cars, trucks, airplanes, ships) contribute significantly to the overall total.

Industrial Processes:

Manufacturing and other industrial activities release carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases.

Land Use Change:

Deforestation and other changes in land use can also release

stored carbon into the atmosphere. **Agriculture:**

Agriculture, including livestock farming and rice cultivation, releases methane, a potent greenhouse gas.

Waste Management:

Decomposition of organic waste in landfills and waste-water treatment also contribute to methane emissions.

Commercial and Residential -

Greenhouse gas emissions from the commercial and residential sector come from fossil fuels burned for heat and the use of cases for refrigeration and cooling in buildings, and non-building specific emissions such as the handling of waste. The commercial and residential sector emissions increase substantially when indirect emissions from electricity enduse are included, largely because buildings use 75% of the electricity generated in the US (e.g., for heating, ventilation and air conditioning; lighting; appliances, and plug loads). When emissions from electricity use are distributed to the commercial and residential end-use sector, commercial and residential activities account for a much larger share of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions.

While both the U.S. and Canada are committed to reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, the U.S. has seen a larger percentage decrease in emissions since 2005 compared to Canada. However, both countries face unique challenges in achieving their climate goals.

Canada's total emissions decreased by 1.40% (from 686 to 677 Mt CO2 eq) from 2005 to 2021. This is a smaller decrease than that of other western countries and regions, notably the United States' decrease by 14.2% (from 6 740 to 5 783 Mt CO2 eq) and European Union's 22.6% decrease (from 4 267 to 3 301 Mt CO2 eq)

Canada is one of the world's largest per capita GHG emitters. Canada ranks 15th out of 17 OECD countries on GHG emissions per capita and scores a "D" grade.

A wide variety of factors have an influence on the level of GHG emissions in Canada. These include Canada's physical geography, demographic changes in its population and economic growth.

Canada has a highly variable climate. This contributes to relatively higher energy use for space heating and cooling in buildings, compared with other industrialized countries. While vast, Canada is also sparsely populated, which leads to longer travel times and higher demand for transportation than in smaller and/or more densely populated countries. In addition, Canada had the fastest population growth and its economy showed the second fastest growth among the G7 countries from 2005 to 2021.

Key impacts of greenhouse gas emissions

The release of GHGs and their concentration in the increasing atmosphere are already having an impact on the environment, human health and the economy. These changes notably manifest in Canada's north, affecting many indigenous and remote communities. The impacts are expected to become more severe, unless united efforts to reduce emissions are undertaken.

Environmental impacts

Overall, average annual temperatures are expected to increase Snow, sea ice and glacier coverage will decrease due to higher temperatures, resulting in rising sea levels and increased coastal flooding. Rising temperatures will also thaw permafrost in the Arctic

Future coastal-erosion rates will likely increase in most areas due to milder winters and smaller ice coverage Overall precipitation levels are expected to increase across most of the country and during all seasons, except for parts of southern Canada where there are indications of an expected decrease in

summer and fall precipitation

The increase in precipitation is expected to be combined with more frequent heavy precipitation events, resulting in higher risks of flooding

Heat waves are likely to increase in frequency and severity, resulting in higher risks of forest fires.

Wildlife species will have difficulty adapting to a warmer climate and will likely be subject to greater stress from diseases and invasive species.

Human health impacts

Higher temperatures and more frequent and severe extreme weather events may increase the risk of deaths from dehydration and heat stroke, and of injuries from intense local weather changes

There may be a greater risk of respiratory and cardiovascular problems and certain types of cancers, as temperatures rise and exacerbate air pollution.

The risk of water-, food-, vectorrodent-borne diseases may and increase.

Mental health can be affected by concerns associated with climate change and its impacts or by the traumas from short-term (extreme weather events) and long term climaterelated hazards (drought, sea-level rise, thawing permafrost).

People living in Canada's northern communities, and vulnerable populations such as children and the elderly, are expected to be the most affected by the changes.

Economic impacts

Agriculture, forestry, tourism and recreation may be affected by changing weather patterns.

Human health impacts are expected to place additional economic stress on health and social support systems.

Damage to infrastructure (for example, roads and bridges) caused by extreme weather events, thawing permafrost and rising sea levels is expected to increase, impacting local populations and resource development.

The above notes from different studies on climate change may provide our readers a better understanding of relationship between human activities and climate change. Hopefully we shall all attempt to do our part in reducing our carbon foot print in our daily activities. Together with our government leaders and scientists, we may be able to achieve our objectives to decrease the warming of the planet.#

May "Learning Crisis" ang Pilipinas ayon sa UNICEF

Hunyo 18, 2025 - Isang opisyal ay nag-abiso UNICEF lumulubhang "learning crisis" Pilipinas na nakita sa mga ulat na maraming estudyante ang lumalagpak sa pagbabasa (reading) at mathematics.

Ayon sa ulat na nalathala noong 2019, si Akihiro Fushimi pinuno ng UNICEF ay nagbigay ng babala na 90% ng mga batang Pilipino sa Grade 5 ay hindi makabasa at 83% naman ay nahihirapan sa basic mathematics.

"Ito ay talagang malubhang problema ng pag-aaral," iginiit ni Fushimi sa press conference niya sa Makati. ("This is a real and widespread learning crisis," Fushimi stressed during a press conference in Makati City.)

Sinabi rin niya na lalong malubha ang problema ng mga bata sa mga lugar ng Bangsang Moro (the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM),

Bukod sa mga problemang galing sa Covid 19 pandemia, nadagdagan pa ng dalawang taong pagkasara ng mga eskuelahan at ang pagkawala ng alternatibong paraan sa pagtulong sa mga bata na makapagaral, lalo na sa mga lugar na naghihirap sa kabuhayan.

Bukod pa sa problemang galing sa pandemia, sinabi ni Fushimi na ang mga paulit-ulit na pangyayari sa kalikasan (nature) ay pinalubha ng "climate change" at nakadagdag lalo sa pag-antala ng progresong matuto ang mga bata.

"100% ng mga eskuelahan sa bansa ay may peligrong ma-apektuhan ng klima kagaya ng mga bagyo, baha, lindol, at pagsiklab ng bolkan. Ang mga pangyayaring ito ay makadadagdag sa ''learning crisis'' ng mga bata.'' ang sabi ni Fushimi.

1.7 milyon ng kabataan ay walang sapat na nutrisyon

Pagkatapos ng pagpula sa sistema ng edukasyon, sinabi ng ibang eksperto na ang nutrisyon ay importante para magtagumpay sa pag-aaral. Isiniwalat ng World Food Program (WFP) noong Martes na may 1.7 milyong kabataan ay hindi wasto ang kanilang nutrisyon na naging dahilan sa kanilang kapurulan sa pag-aaral at ang problemang ito ay kumakalat sa buong bansa.

Sinabi ni Dipayan Bhattacharyya, WFP deputy country director, na kahit may programa ang gobyerno na nagpapakain sa kabataan, ito ay hindi sapat sa pagbaka sa kakulangan ng mga sustansyang kailangan na naging dahilan sa mga problemang kagaya ng "micronutrient deficiencies, obesity and overweight."

Iginiit niya na kapag may kakulangan sa sustansya ang pagkain ng mga kabataan, ito ay sagabal hindi lamang sa kanilang pag-aaral, ganoon din sa kanilang pagkakaroon ng malusog na katawan.

Ang payo niya sa gobyerno ay ang pagsunod sa batas Republic Act 11037, Masustansyang Pagkain para sa Batang Pilipino Act na gabay sa lahat ng kailangang gawin ng Department of Education, Department of Social Welfare nagbabayad naman sila para sa kanilang at Development and the National Nutrition Council.

Idinagdag ni Bhattacharyya na importante na pag-ukulan ng pansin ng gobyerno ang pagbaka sa kahirapan ng mga tao at kakulangan sa nutrisyon upang magtagumpay ang kabataan sa kanilang pag-aaral.#

"One of the things that I noticed is the bathrooms. Kailangang-kailangan nating linisin at pagandahin ang mga bathroom (We really need to clean and improve the bathrooms)," Marcos told reporters.

Fo Niemi - A Lifelong Crusader for Human Rights and Systemic Justice

In a modest office tucked away in Montreal, the heartbeat of one of Canada's most persistent civil rights organizations continues to beat steadily, powered by a man whose life has been defined by advocacy, justice, and an unshakable belief in equality. That man is Fo Niemi, co-founder and Executive Director of the Center for Research-Action on Race Relations (CRARR), a small but mighty organization fighting systemic discrimination for over four decades.

Roots in Compassion

Mr. Niemi's journey into civil rights began in childhood, not in the courtroom or through academic theory, but around the kitchen table. "I come from a family with a strong tradition of humanitarian work," he said. "My mother instilled in us a deep sense of social conscience and civic responsibility."

That moral compass guided Niemi through his studies in social work and political science at McGill University, where he chose to specialize in community organizing. Working with Project Genesis, he supported marginalized groups in housing and crime prevention initiatives, especially for senior citizens and immigrant families.

"These experiences opened my eyes to how poverty, age, and immigration status intersect with systemic inequality," he explained. "It became clear that community work alone wasn't enough. We needed legal tools and policy reform to create lasting change."

The Birth of CRARR

The 1980s were a time of heightened racial tensions and structural exclusion, especially for Montreal's Asian and English-speaking Black communities. Niemi, then a young volunteer, was drawn into grassroots efforts that sought to address the injustices plaguing these groups.

"These communities were dealing with racism in employment, housing, and especially interactions with the police," he recalled. "We realized we needed an organization that could not only advocate but use the Canadian and Quebec charters of rights to hold institutions accountable."

Thus, CRARR was born—built by Niemi and a coalition of community leaders, many of whom have since passed on. The organization's core mission? Tackle racism through legal advocacy, public education, and policy change.

Staying Small, Thinking Big

Despite its size, CRARR has wielded influence far beyond its

modest budget and staffing. Niemi attributes this to their intentional structure. "We avoid bureaucracy," he said. "We focus on tangible results—outcomes that matter to real people."

Whereas other advocacy groups may emphasize cultural events or social integration, CRARR's approach zeroes in on systemic discrimination. Niemi proudly notes that CRARR was ahead of its time in addressing not just racism, but how it intersects with gender, class, and disability.

Challenges on the Frontlines

While police relations remain a key issue, especially within Montreal's Black communities, Niemi points to employment discrimination and labor relations as the most frustrating battlegrounds in recent years.

"Unions have become a major obstacle to racial equality," he stated bluntly. "Many union executives remain overwhelmingly white, and they often fail to address racism within the workplace."

described numerous cases where immigrant women of color, such as orderlies, caregivers, and manufacturing workers, found themselves abandoned by their unions. The existing labor tribunal system, he added, only worsens the situation.

"There's not a single person of color on the administrative labor tribunal," he said. "If you're unionized and face racial discrimination, your only recourse is through your union. If the union fails you, you're stuck. It's a systemic dead-end."

The Filipino Community and the speaking Health Care Crisis up to fail und

Niemi highlighted the particular struggles of Montreal's Filipino community, many of whom work in the healthcare sector, in a heavily unionized environment. Despite their vital contributions, these workers often face racial and gender discrimination without meaningful support.

"We've seen case after case where Filipino nurses and orderlies report harassment and racism, only to be ignored or dismissed by their unions," he said. "It's disheartening—and unjust."

The Shadow of Bill 96 (Law 14)

Niemi also criticized Quebec's controversial language legislation, formerly Bill 96 and now Law 14, for deepening educational and economic inequities. "Education is the key to opportunity," he said. "Yet newcomers, especially English-

speaking immigrants, are being set up to fail under this law."

He warned that many students are struggling to meet the law's French-language requirements in CEGEP and beyond, which creates systemic exclusion from academic and professional advancement.

A Legacy of Relentless Advocacy

As CRARR enters its fifth decade, Niemi remains resolute. "This work is hard. It can be isolating. But we've seen the lives it changes and the barriers we've broken," he said. "Justice doesn't come easily. But with persistence and solidarity, it comes." Fo Niemi is not just a civil rights advocate—he's a living testament to the power of grassroots activism, legal advocacy, and moral clarity. And in a world still reckoning with the scars of systemic injustice, his voice remains as vital as ever.#

Humiliated and Ignored: Chinese Woman Speaks Out After Racial Profiling Incident at Montreal McDonald's Restaurant

A Chinese woman who was expelled from a McDonald's restaurant in Montreal by police officers is speaking out against the Québec Human Rights Commission's decision to dismiss her complaint, which she believes was a clear case of racial profiling and social discrimination.

The incident, which took place in March 2023 at the McDonald's on Saint-Jacques Street West, has left lasting emotional scars on Ms. Nay Ir, a woman in her fifties and mother of two, including an autistic son. She recalls being humiliated and devastated after two police officers—one male and one female—escorted her out of the restaurant without giving her the opportunity to properly explain herself or present identification.

Earlier that morning, Ms. Ir had purchased breakfast from the same McDonald's while taking her son to school. She returned shortly after to use the washroom while her autistic son waited in the parked car outside. Upon exiting the washroom, she was told by police that someone had reported her for "making money" inside the restaurant—a term often used to imply begging.

"I was shocked," Ms. Ir said in an emotional interview. "I didn't ask anyone for money. I'm just a mother, and I bought food there earlier that same morning. Why didn't they ask me

who I am, or check the facts first?"

When she requested to speak inside the restaurant, the police insisted she step outside. Once outside, she was barred from reentering and escorted away in view of onlookers. Ms. Ir describes the moment as "humiliating, dehumanizing, and deeply racist." To make matters worse, Ms. Ir says the officers ignored her repeated attempts to show proof of her purchase and never asked for her ID. "If I had done something wrong, they could have asked for mv license or asked where I live. But they just assumed I was a beggar because of how I look."

The trauma from the event, she says, has severely impacted her mental health. "I cried for days. For two



From Page 5 Humiliated and ignored years, I couldn't go out, couldn't talk to people. I lost my confidence. I became depressed and afraid—afraid of the public, afraid of police, afraid of everything."

The Québec Human Rights Commission has since dismissed her complaint, stating the incident did not amount to discrimination—an outcome Ms. Ir calls "devastating and unjust." She believes her appearance, race, and clothing on that day—blue jacket, red hat, and a backpack—led to her being unfairly targeted, while a white man standing inside the restaurant at the same time was not questioned or removed.

Adding further concern, Ms. Ir's legal advocate revealed that the original 911 call from the McDonald's manager had described a white

woman. Yet, when police arrived, they approached and expelled Ms. Ir, an Asian woman, without verifying details or confirming identities.

"This was not just a mistake," said Ms. Ir. "It was racial profiling. I'm speaking out because if they do this to another person who can't handle it, they might take their own life. I want to make sure this doesn't happen to anyone else."

Ms. Ir now urges other members of the Asian community—and all marginalized groups—to speak up against racism, even when institutions fail them.

"We came to this country for justice, peace, and fairness—not to be treated as second-class citizens. We have to stand up. This is not just about me. This is about human dignity."#

The afternoon's program was

anchored by two rounds of expert panels.

Montreal also named June as country for immigration to Canada, Filipino Heritage Month, by the local Côte-des-Neiges-Notre-Dame-de-Grâce Council in February 2018, introduced by Councilor Marvin Rotrand and seconded by Councilor Lionel Perez. which led to the formation of the Filipino Heritage Society of Montreal (FHSM) in March 2018 under the chairmanship of Al Abdon who still continues to be the head of the organization, assisted by a group of committed Montrealers in performing various tasks required.

It is interesting to take note of the fact that over the past several years, since the 1960's, more Filipino immigrants work and live in the Cote des Neiges district which has become like a little Philippine village because of its proximity to hospitals and clinics, and where Filipino-owned grocery stores and restaurants are located. The largest community is found in the Greater Toronto Area with a population of 272,470. Large numbers also live in the metropolitan areas of Vancouver (141,230), Calgary (83,815), Winnipeg (81,140), Edmonton (77,085) and Montreal (39,020) which appears to have one of the lowest populations of Filipino Canadians in urban centers, There are also Filipinos who live in other remote areas of the country like the Yukon and the Yellow Knife Territory.

During the 2021 census of population, 757,410 people reported that they were born in the Philippines and had immigrated to Canada, making

Alberta was the first Canadian province the Philippines the third largest source following India (1.2 million) and China (830,980).

> The Independence Day parade is the biggest feature of Montreal's celebration of Philippine Independene Day that culminates in a big picnic and entertainment at the MacKenzie King Park on Cote St. Catherine where the bust of Dr. Jose Rizal is also located and a special place designated as Place Jose Rizal. revered and well-known figure whom they look up to as a virtuous person.

The long history of contact with Spain and the United States continues to have a significant impact on the Filipino identity. One example is the influence of American standards of beauty, which are often measured in the Philippines by the possession of Western physical traits – such as fair skin and curly hair. Another example is the prominence of Christian ideology since the introduction of Christianity by the Spanish missionaries. Indeed, when compared to other countries on the Asian continent, the Philippines has one of the highest Christian populations. Statistics indicate that the Philippines has 80% Roman Catholics and 20% of other religious denominations.

Social hierarchy in the Philippines is determined according to age and social status. Nearly all Filipinos are taught from an early age about the importance of the underpinning social hierarchy. Gestures, terms of address communication styles vary depending on who one interacts with and their relative positions in the social hierarchy. For example, it is expected that, if you are referring to someone who is older than you but within the same generation, you use the terms kuya for males and ate for females (for example, Ate Cora or Kuya Jess). Failing to do so is considered highly disrespectful and a

established hierarchy.

Kapwa (fellowship togetherness) is a core value that explains Filipinos' interpersonal behaviour. The term generally refers to a shared identity whereby people bond together despite differences in wealth or social status. Kapwa is related to the collectivistic nature of Filipino society. It is believed that what is good for one person will be good for the collective and ought to be shared with fellow people. Being branded as not having any kapwa is an insult as it implies that the person does not belong to a

The concept of 'hiya' is also one of the underpinning factors influencing how Filipinos behave and interact with others. While hiva translates roughly into English as 'shame' or 'embarrassment', on a deeper level it refers to one's sense of self, propriety and respect. Filipinos may be more motivated to succeed by a fear of shame rather than fear of failing the task at hand. To avoid experiencing shame, they may try to give 'face' to around them those through complimenting them and avoiding direct criticism. Individuals will often try to be generous and hospitable to avoid hiya and to maintain kapwa.

Filipinos are usually very warm and friendly people who enjoy conversing with those around them. It is common to find strangers engaging in conversation or sharing stories to family, friends or foreigners about their hometown, family or country, Filipinos

are often expressive and sentimental whilst maintaining a light-hearted demeanor. Filipinos are often willing to share stories of their past that may be considered personal.


Alongside their warming and light-hearted demeanor, the general approach to life is of acceptance. 'Bahala na' (come what may) captures the strong belief among many Filipinos that whatever may happen is a part of God's will. Any individual or group success is often attributed to fate or God rather than efforts. This indicates a fatalistic attitude throughout society whereby Filipinos are generally accepting of theirs and others circumstances. However, this does not mean Filipinos are passive. Rather, they are hardworking and will often do their best to help themselves and their

family.

Festivals are an integral part of Filipino culture, serving as celebrations of history, religion, and community. From the lively Sinulog Festival to the colorful Ati-Atihan Festival, each event is a testament to the Filipino spirit.

In an era where globalization threatens to homogenize distinct cultural identities, the challenge of preserving the rich tapestry of Filipino cultural heritage becomes paramount. Thus, it becomes imperative to have a collective commitment to the celebration and preservation of Filipino cultural heritage, underscoring its vital role in fostering identity and community in an increasingly interconnected world. 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

Greek chicken w Lemon Rice Ingredients Chicken

- 1 tbsp paprika
- 1 tbsp garlic powder
- 2 tsp dried oregano
- 1/4 tsp red pepper flakes
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp black pepper
- 1.5 lb chicken breasts skinless and boneless, diced
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- Lemon Rice
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes halved
- 6 cloves garlic minced
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp black pepper
- 1 cup spinach chopped
- 2 cups basmati rice cooked
- 15 oz can chickpeas rinsed and drained
- 1 lemon juiced

Cheese

- 1 cup feta cheese crumbled
- 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 1/4 tsp dried oregano
- 2 tbsp fresh dill chopped Garnish

Lemon cut into wedges Fresh dill chopped

Instructions Chicken

In a small bowl, combine paprika, garlic powder, dried oregano, red pepper flakes, salt and black pepper.

Cover diced chicken with the mixture of spices.

Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add in the olive oil.

Once hot, add in the chicken and sear for 4 minutes on one side, then flip and cook for another 4 minutes on the other side.

Remove the chicken from the skillet once it's fully cooked.

Lemon Rice

Add olive oil into the same, now empty skillet. Add in the cherry tomatoes, garlic, dried oregano, salt, and black pepper. Stir and cook for 2 minutes until the tomatoes soften.

Add in spinach and cook for another 2 minutes until it wilts.

Add cooked basmati rice, chickpeas

and give it a stir.

Finally, squeeze over all the juice from the lemon. Let it cook for another 2-3 minutes.

Assembly

In a bowl, combine feta cheese, olive oil, oregano and fresh dill.

Add half of the cheese mixture into the skillet and stir it in.

Add the cooked chicken back into the skillet and cook until the chicken reheats.

Remove from heat, and sprinkle with the remaining cheese mixture. Garnish with lemon wedges and fresh dill before serving.


When eating, squeeze some of the lemon juice from the wedges for a little more acidity. Enjoy!

Easy Pineapple Pork Chops

Prep: 5 mins Cook: 15 mins Total: 20 mins Servings: 4

Easy pineapple pork chops combine juicy and tender pork chops with the sweet and sour flavors of pineapple, onion and garlic, and just a touch of honey for added sweetness. This quick pork skillet is the perfect quick weeknight meal.

Ingredients

- 4 pork chops, boneless (medium size) Sea salt, to season
- Ground black pepper, to season
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon butter, unsalted
- 4 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed 1 small white onion, peeled and sliced
- 1 1/2 cups pineapple, cut in cubes 2 tablespoons honey

Fresh cilantro and green onions for garnish

Serve with rice or quinoa Instructions

Season pork chops with salt and pepper. Next heat a large skillet with oil on medium-high heat.

Add the onion and garlic to the skillet and saute for 2 minutes.

Place the pork chops into the hot large skillet along with the onions and cook on one side for 4-5 minutes until golden. Then push the pork chop to one side of the skillet to make space and flip the pork chops to cook the other side. Make the sweet and sour sauce, by adding the butter, and pineapple chunks into the empty space in the skillet. Stir the sauce over the pork chops and coat the pork chops with the sauce. Cook the pork chops in the sauce for about 3-5 minutes until the pork chops reach an internal temp of 145 degrees F. Finally decrease the heat to medium and add in the honey. Stir through the pineapple sauce and remove from the heat and set aside to rest for 5 minutes. Serve the pork and pineapple sauce with a side of white rice and garnish with some freshly chopped cilantro. You also could serve this with pineapple slices on the side or add extra pineapple chunks as a garnish to your pork chops. Notes

- 1 1/4 lbs chicken breast tenderloins
- 2 Tbsp olive oil
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper 1 lb fresh asparagus, trimmed of tough ends, chopped into 2-inch pieces (look for thinner stalks. Green beans are another good option)
- 1 1/2 cups matchstick carrots
- 1 cup grape tomatoes, halved

Instructions

In a mixing bowl whisk together salad dressing, balsamic vinegar, honey and red pepper flakes, set aside.

Heat olive oil in a 12-inch skillet over medium-high heat. Season chicken with salt and pepper to taste, then place chicken evenly in skillet.

Cook about 6 - 7 minutes, rotating once halfway through cooking, until chicken has cooked through (meanwhile, chop asparagus and tomatoes). Add half the dressing mixture to skillet and rotate chicken to evenly coat.

Transfer chicken to a large plate or a serving platter while leaving sauce in skillet. Add asparagus and carrots to skillet, season with salt and pepper to taste and cook, stirring frequently, until crisp tender, about 4 minutes. Transfer veggies to plate or platter with chicken. Add remaining dressing mixture to skillet and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened, about 1 minute. Add tomatoes to chicken and veggies and drizzle dressing mixture in pan over top (or return chicken and veggies to pan and toss to coat). Then serve with steamed rice or mashed potatoes.

British-Indian man lone survivor of

Air India crash

Ramesh is the only known survivor of the London-bound Air India flight carrying 242 people that crashed shortly after takeoff in the north-west Indian city of Ahmedabad.

The 40-year-old is one of the 53 British nationals plus 169 Indian nationals, one Canadian and seven Portuguese nationals who were onboard the Boeing 787 Dreamliner as passengers in addition to two pilots and 10 cabin crew.

He had been sitting near an emergency exit, in seat 11A, of the London-bound flight and managed to jump out, Ahmedabad senior police officer Vidhi Chaudhary said.

"Thirty seconds after takeoff there was a loud noise and then the plane crashed. It all happened so quickly," Mr Viswash told the Hindustan Times from a general ward in the civil hospital in Asarwa, Ahmedabad.

"When I got up, there were bodies all around me. I was scared. I stood up and ran. There were pieces of the plane all around me. Someone grabbed hold of me and put me in an

ambulance and brought me to the hospital," he added.

Social media footage shown on Indian news channels showed a man in a bloodstained white T-shirt and dark pants limping on a street and being helped by a medic. The survivor told the Hindustan Times he was returning to the UK, where he has lived for 20 years, with his brother, who was also on the same flight, after visiting family in India.

Dr Dhaval Gameti, who treated Mr Viswash, said: "He was disorientated, with multiple injuries all over his body. But he seems to be out of danger."

The Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner was engulfed in a huge fireball after crashing into the Meghani Nagar residential area minutes after taking off at 1.38pm local time (09:08 BST) on Thursday.

Mr Ajay Valgi, a cousin of Mr Viswash who lives in Leicester, central England, told the BBC that Mr Viswash spoke by phone to confirm he was all

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Meet Quebec's new Liberal leader, Pablo Rodriguez, as he steps in to rebuild his party

Former federal minister Pablo Rodriguez was elected leader on June 14, 2025, in a decisive moment for Quebec's Liberal Party, capturing just over 52.3 percent of the vote after two rounds in a race with five candidates. This victory marks a turning point for the party, which faces a challenging rebuild ahead of the October 2026 provincial election.

A leader with federal pedigree

Born in Argentina and raised in Sherbrooke from the age of eight, Rodriguez brings a wealth of experience to provincial politics. He represented Montreal's Honoré Mercier riding as a Liberal MP from 2004–2011 and again from 2015–2025.

His experience includes high profile roles as Minister of Transport and Minister of Canadian Heritage within former Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's cabinet. He stepped down from the federal cabinet and caucus to pursue this leader

The leadership contest

The leadership contest, held between June 9 and 14 in Quebec City, drew five contenders. Charles Milliard, the former head of the Quebec Chambers of Commerce, ran a close second, receiving around 47.7 percent in the final round. Other notable candidates included Karl

(We must get rid of this bad government and prevent the threat of another referendum, said Pablo Rodriguez in his victory speech).

Blackburn, Marc Bélanger, and Mario Roy, who were eliminated in the first ballot.

On stage, Rodriguez reached across former rival lines, inviting all contenders forward in a gesture of unity. "No matter who you supported, we're all together today, united," he told volunteers. He also praised Milliard specifically, saying he sees great value in his experience and foresight.

Speaking after the win,

Rodriguez struck a hopeful tone as he said "Starting today, the work begins," he said, pledging to convene with campaign teams and caucus as one united entity preparing for 2026. Notably, he does not yet hold a seat in the National Assembly and said he will not rush to enter through a by-election. Instead, he plans to tour every riding, region, and community to strengthen the party at the grassroots level. The challenges ahead

The Liberals are rebuilding

from a steep decline after they were swept from power in 2018 and sinking to just 21 seats and 14 percent in 2022, a historic low under former leader Dominique Anglade. More troubling, the party has struggled to resonate with francophone voters outside Montreal.

Yet there are signs of renewed optimism. A Léger poll from May showed the Liberals, under Rodriguez, leading the Parti Québécois by one point at 31 percent.

Meanwhile, incumbent Premier François Legault's CAQ government is losing support, while the PQ is surging, setting the stage for a potential three way struggle in the

Now, Rodriguez must translate this energy into a strategy that appeals not just in Montreal, but in all corners of Quebec. With a provincial election looming in 16 months, the stakes could not be higher.

Whether this former federal heavyweight can revive a fractured party, and perhaps rewrite the province's political narrative, remains Quebec's most compelling question.

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Trump abruptly leaves G7 summit after signalling deepening Israel-Iran conflicts

KANANASKIS, Alberta — President Donald Trump abruptly announced that he would leave the G7 summit a day early and return to Washington shortly after posting an ominous social media message that appeared to suggest more carnage in Iran.

Press secretary Karoline Leavitt, in a post on X, said that "much was accomplished" during Trump's meetings on Monday with other leaders at the summit in Canada. But, she continued, "because of what's going on in the Middle East, President Trump will be leaving tonight after dinner with Heads of State."

The change of plans only added to the sense of uncertainty around Israel's ongoing military operation in Iran, which Trump seemed to warn was about to intensify in an ominous and somewhat cryptic social media post after a day of meeting with world leaders.

"Iran should have signed the 'deal' I told them to sign. What a shame, and waste of human life," Trump wrote in a TruthSocial post late Monday. "Simply stated, IRAN CAN NOT HAVE A NUCLEAR WEAPON. I said it over and over again!"

He closed it on an alarming note: "Everyone should immediately evacuate Tehran!"

The post came after a long day of meetings with world leaders at the G7 summit, where European officials suggested that the U.S. was holding up a joint statement calling for an end to the burgeoning conflict between Israel and Iran.

It's not clear what triggered the startling message, casually calling for the evacuation of a city of 10 million people — a warning that came just hours after Israel's government issued

its own evacuation order to citizens in anything that took place during the northern Tehran warning them of its summit, which continued with a dinner

expanding campaign.

Nor was it clear whether Trump is privy to new plans by Israel to strike at additional targets inside Iran, or simply trying to scare Tehran back into nuclear talks.

Officials at the White House and the Pentagon sought to clarify in nearly identical posts on X that U.S. forces in the region would remain in a "defensive" posture and were not about to join Israel's offensive.

When Trump posed with leaders for the G-7 "family photo" before heading back to the airport, he told members of the press on hand that events in the Middle East left him little choice.

"I have to be back as soon as I can," the president said, making clear his departure was not a response to Monday evening and more meetings on Tuesday.

"I wish I could stay for tomorrow, but they understand," Trump said of the other leaders.

His comments to reporters earlier on Monday, in between meetings with other world leaders, were more explicit in that regard.

"Iran is not winning this war, and they should talk and they should talk immediately before it's too late," Trump said.

A short while later, when asked again about the situation in Iran, the president was more optimistic: "I think Iran basically is at the negotiating table. They want to make a deal and as soon as I leave here we're going to be doing something," he said.

The president's abrupt

departure harkened back to the last G7 summit in Canada in 2018, when Trump left in turmoil after refusing to sign onto the joint communique out of frustration with then-Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

While Trump has gotten along far better with his successor, Prime Minister Mark Carney, his penchant for drama at these multilateral gatherings has not abated.

After weeks of optimism about a possible deal with Iran to curb its nuclear program, Trump reversed course last week following Israel's initial assault that took out several of Iran's top military officials, making clear that he supported Israel's campaign while framing it as a consequence for Tehran's footdragging on a potential deal.

The nascent conflict has split Trump's coalition, dividing GOP hawks and military leaders who've long called for a tougher approach to Iran and the "restrainer" wing of his movement, typified by former adviser Steve Bannon, podcaster Ben Shapiro and former Fox News Channel host Tucker Carlson.

Trump, when asked by a reporter about Carlson's comments criticizing him for supporting Israel's escalating campaign against Iran, scoffed and suggested he "go get a television network and say it so people listen."

Hours later, some 33 minutes after his dire warning about evacuating Tehran, the president posted again, making clear the former cable news personality was still on his mind.

He wrote: "Somebody please explain to kooky Tucker Carlson that, 'IRAN CAN NOT HAVE A NUCLEAR WEAPON!"

STM maintenance workers resume strike for two more days

After a pause for the Formula 1 Grand Prix weekend, maintenance workers at the Société de transport de Montréal (STM) are resuming their strike for two more days.

On Monday and Tuesday, bus and Metro services will run during the morning and afternoon rush hours, as well as late in the evening.

Outside these times, service will be reduced to 50 per cent.

The strike by the 2,400 STM maintenance workers began last Monday.

The strike was suspended for the Grand Prix weekend, with safety concerns cited as the reason for the pause due to the large number of people expected to travel to Île Notre-Dame for the event.

The nine-day strike by the Fédération des employé(e)s des services publics union, affiliated with the Confédération des syndicats nationaux (CSN), is scheduled to end on Tuesday at

10 p.m.

The first mediation meeting between STM management and the maintenance workers' union is scheduled to take place on Monday.

Last Friday, the mediator appointed by Quebec met separately with STM management and the union to familiarize himself with the case and each

party's position.

Outsourcing is currently one of the main points of contention.

Stuck with a tight budget, the STM says it needs flexibility.

Meanwhile, the union argues it is fighting against the privatization of certain services and for the preservation of public service jobs. #

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
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
